Amendment No. 1, S. to **Senate Joint Resolution 5** was offered by Senator Benson.

Substitute Amendment 1, S., to **Senate Resolution 5**

Relating to the rules of the senate.

Resolved by the senate, That the senate rules in force at the end of the 1963 regular session, except senate rules 29, 30 and 31, be and they are hereby adopted as the rules of the 1965 senate; and, be it further

Resolved, That senate rules 29, 30 and 31, in force at the end of the 1963 regular session, be amended to read:

SENATE RULE 29. COPIES OF BILLS, ETC.

~~One original and~~ At least ~~four carbon~~ 5 copies of all bills and resolutions shall be presented. The 1st copy shall be marked "~~Original~~" "*Jacket Copy*" and one of the other copies marked "~~Duplicate~~" "*LRB File Copy*". ~~One The~~ copy marked "*LRB File Copy*" shall be delivered to the printer, and one copy promptly returned to the Legislative Reference Bureau with the introductory information entered on the cover. One of the other copies shall be kept on file at the Clerk's desk.

SENATE RULE 30. BILL COVERS.

There shall be attached to each bill or resolution sent to the Clerk's desk a substantial ~~back~~ cover which shall be furnished by the Chief Clerk and which shall bear no writing except the number of the bill and the name of the person or Committee introducing it and shall be enclosed in an envelope as provided in rule 31.

SENATE RULE 31. FILING OF BILLS, ETC.

(1) The Bureau of Purchases shall provide envelopes of a suitable size to hold any bill, memorial or resolution and the papers pertaining thereto, respectively, without folding or rolling, and cases or drawers for the vertical filing thereof, without folding. The Clerk shall not file any paper for any purpose, the cover of which has been either folded or rolled. The Clerk shall provide a substantial ~~back~~ cover for bills. Such envelopes and ~~backs~~ covers shall be distinguished from those of the Assembly by color. The envelopes shall be properly printed and ruled to receive the notations of the Clerk. Be it further

Resolved, That senate rules 29, 30 and 31, as herein amended, be and they are hereby adopted as senate rules 29, 30 and 31 of the 1965 senate.
