PHYSICAL PLANT MAINTENANCE COMMITTEE

Report to the
1965 Wisconsin Legislature

Function of the Committee

The physical plant maintenance committee, a permanent legislative committee, exists by authority of §13.45, Wis. Stats. The committee was first created pursuant to Ch. 462, Laws 1957. It is directed to call the attention of the legislature to maintenance projects necessary to the upkeep of the

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capitol, state office buildings, executive mansion and heating plant in Madison. The complete committee records and proceedings are on file in the legislative council offices.

General Report of the Committee

The committee held its first meeting on June 12, 1963, at which time it discussed the financing of maintenance projects and new construction in the executive mansion, the capitol, the capitol power plant and the state office building. The committee also discussed at length the condition of the war museum on the 4th floor of the north wing of the Capitol. The committee considered an alternative relocation in the lower rotunda of the Capitol. Subsequent developments led to rehabilitation of the quarters on the 4th floor and the war museum is still located there.

The committee reviewed the recommendations it had made over the years and is pleased to report that practically all of them have been completed or are under way at this time. There are additional items included in the requests to the State Building Commission for the 1965-67 biennium.

One recommendation which the committee submitted several years ago has not been carried out to the fullest extent possible. This relates to policing of the Capitol building. The committee found that since children have free access to the building, they tend to use it as a playground. The location of the war museum on the 4th floor attracts children to that area and it is virtually impossible to adequately control them with the present guard staff. The committee had recommended the employment of mature university students on a part time basis to supplement the present guard personnel. It might also be possible to employ retired guards on a part time basis. The committee urges that further attention be given to improvement of supervision in the Capitol.

Another committee recommendation has been fulfilled only in part. The committee strongly urged more adequate

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parking space around the Capitol. The situation is particularly critical when the legislature is in session. The committee again emphasizes the necessity for a speedy solution to the pressing problem.
