Senate Joint Resolution 36

To amend article VII, section 24 of the constitution, relating to the retirement and eligibility for office and service after retirement of supreme court justices and judges of other courts of record (1st consideration).

Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That article VII, section 24 of the constitution be amended to read:

(Article VII) Section 24. No person seventy years of age or over may take office as a supreme court justice or ~~circu~~ judge of any other court of record. No person may take or hold such office unless he is licensed to practice law in this state and has been so licensed for five years immediately prior to his election or appointment. No supreme court justice or ~~circu~~ judge of any other court of record may serve beyond the end of the month in July 31 following the date on which he attains the age of seventy, but any such justice or judge may complete the term in which he is serving or to which he has been elected when this section take effect. Any person retired under the provisions of this section may, at the request of the chief justice of the supreme court, serve temporarily as a circuit judge and shall be compensated as the legislature provides. This section shall take effect on July first following the referendum at which it is approved. A person who has served six or more years as a supreme court justice or judge of any other court of record may serve temporarily, on appointment by the chief justice of the supreme court or by any associate justice designated by the supreme court, as a judge of a court of record, other than the supreme court, under such general laws as the legislature may adopt. Be it further

Resolved, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and

that it be published for three months previous to the time of holding such election. Be it further

Resolved, That the 1965 legislature finds this amendment to contain several separable questions and recommends that, should the next succeeding legislature agree to this amendment on second consideration, 3 separate ballot questions be submitted to the voters in substantially the following form:

1. Shall judges of the county courts, in order to take office, be required to be less than 70 years of age and be licensed for a minimum of 5 years?

2. Shall justices of the supreme court or judges of any other court of record retire on the July 31 following their becoming 70 years of age?

3. Shall retired justices or judges of any court of record having 6 or more years of experience be allowed temporary appointment as judges under such laws as the legislature may adopt?
