Senate Joint Resolution 5

To amend article V, sections 1 and 3 of the constitution, relating to 4-year terms of office for the governor and lieutenant governor and the election of those officers by a single vote.

Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That article V, sections 1 and 3 of the constitution be amended to read:

(Article V) Section 1. The executive power shall be vested in a governor, who shall hold his office for ~~two~~ four years; a lieutenant governor shall be elected at the same time, and for the same term.

Section 3. The governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected by the qualified electors of the state at the times and places of choosing members of the legislature. *Beginning with the general election in 1970, they shall be chosen jointly, by the casting by each voter of a single vote applicable to both offices.* The persons respectively having the highest number of votes *cast jointly for them* for governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected; but in case two or more *states* shall have an equal and the highest number of votes for governor, ~~or~~ and lieutenant governor, the two houses of the legislature, at its next annual session shall forthwith, by joint ballot, choose one of the ~~persons~~ *states* so having an equal and the highest number of votes for governor, ~~or~~ and lieutenant governor. The returns of election for governor and lieutenant governor shall be made in such manner as shall be provided by law. Be it further

Resolved, That these proposed amendments be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and that they be published for 3 months previous to the time of holding such election. Be it further

Resolved, That the 1965 legislature respectfully recommends to the 1967 legislature that the 2 ballot questions used in the submission of these amendments to the people, if these amendments gain second approval, be substantially in the following form:

1. Shall section 1 of article V of the state constitution be amended to increase the terms of office of the governor and lieutenant governor to 4 years?

2. Shall section 3 of article V of the state constitution be amended to provide that the governor and lieutenant governor shall be elected on a joint ticket by the casting of a single vote applicable to both offices?
