Senate Joint Resolution 44

Relating to increases for certain public officers during their term (1st consideration).

Read a second time.

Amendment No. 1, S. was adopted.

The joint resolution was ordered engrossed and read a third time.

Upon motion of Senator Knowles, with unanimous consent, the joint resolution was considered for final action at this time.

Senate Joint Resolution 44

To amend article IV, section 26 of the constitution, relating to increases for certain public officers during their term (1st consideration).

Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That article IV, section 26 of the constitution be amended to read:

(Article IV) Section 26. The legislature shall never grant any extra compensation to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been ren-

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dered or the contract entered into; nor shall the compensation of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office, *except after the fourth year of such term*. This section shall not apply to increased benefits for teachers under a teachers' retirement system when such increased benefits are provided by a legislative act passed on a call of yeas and nays by a three-fourths vote of all the members elected to both houses of the legislature. Be it further

Resolved, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and that it be published for three months previous to the time of holding such election.

Was read a third time.

The question was: Shall the joint resolution be adopted?

The ayes and noes were required and the vote was: ayes, 20; noes, 12; absent or not voting, 1; as follows:

Absent or not voting—Senator Roseleip—1.

So the joint resolution was adopted.
