Senate Joint Resolution 47

To amend article IV, section 26 of the constitution, relating to increases in compensation for certain public officers during their term (1st consideration).

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Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring, That article IV, section 26 of the constitution be amended to read:

(Article IV) Section 26. The legislature shall never grant any extra compensation to any public officer, agent, servant or contractor, after the services shall have been rendered or the contract entered into; nor shall the compensation of any public officer be increased or diminished during his term of office. *This section shall not apply to an increase in the compensation of a public officer whose term of office is more than six years.* This section shall not apply to increased benefits for teachers under a teachers' retirement system when such increased benefits are provided by a legislative act passed on a call of yeas and nays by a three-fourths vote of all the members elected to both houses of the legislature. Be it further

Resolved, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election and that it be published for three months previous to the time of holding such election.
