### **Senate Joint Resolution 51**

To create article XII, section 3 of the constitution, relating to a new method of constitutional revision.

*Resolved by the senate, the assembly concurring,* That article XII, section 3 of the constitution be created to read:

(Article XII) Section 3. In addition to the method provided in section 2, a revision of all or part of this constitution may be proposed in either house of the legislature,

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and, if the proposed revision is agreed to by at least two-thirds of all the members of each house, the proposed revision shall, with the yeas and nays thereon, be entered in the journals of both houses and referred by the secretary of state to the people for their approval or rejection at the next regular April or November general election "occurring at least 6 months after the final adoption of such proposed revision by the legislature" unless the legislature in the joint resolution proposing the revision orders a special election for the purpose, which special election shall take place no earlier than 6 months after the final adoption of such proposed revision by the legislature". A proposed revision may deal with more than one subject and shall be voted on as one question. If the people approve and ratify such proposed revision by a majority of the electors voting thereon, such revision shall become a part or all of the constitution. The board of canvassers shall notify the governor if the revision was adopted, and the governor shall thereupon proclaim it, and the revision shall be in effect as the constitution or as a part of the constitution from the date of such proclamation. Be it further

*Resolved*, That this proposed amendment be referred to the legislature to be chosen at the next general election, and that it be published for 3 months previous to the time of holding such election.
