Public Policy Involved

This bill will serve to correct an unfortunate circumstance which could deprive a substantial number of teachers of adequate retirement benefits. The potential loss of benefits arises solely from the fact that legislative action on Senate Bills 472 and 473 was delayed until after the close of the 1964-65 school year. It was clearly the intent of the Retirement Research Council to provide improved benefits for the teachers who would be affected by this bill.

Recommendation

It is the opinion of this committee that passage of this bill would be in the public interest.

(Note: Due to the fact that some of the payments which would be authorized by this bill would have retroactive effect, passage of the bill will require an affirmative vote of three-fourths of the members of each house of the legislature.)
