Report of Joint Survey Committee to Senate Bill 580

Public Policy Involved

The Joint Survey Committee on Retirement Systems has opposed consistently any effort to permit a broad scale change in the method of granting retirement credits for past service. The committee has, however, on several occasions supported measures which would grant relief to limited groups of employes, primarily on the grounds that such employes were denied retirement credits through circumstances beyond their personal control; such is certainly the case with respect to the extremely limited number of employes who could benefit from the provisions of this bill. Additional justification would seem to derive, with respect to this bill, from the fact that no person can benefit from the bill without positive, affirmative action by the governing body of the municipality by which the person is employed.

Recommendation

The bill was recommended for introduction by this committee, with a recommendation for passage.
