Summary Report

Joint State of Wisconsin—City of Madison  
Planning Committee

Central Madison State Office Facilities Long-Range  
Planning Guide

Introduction

The 1967 Wisconsin Legislature, in Chapter 256, Laws of 1967, determined that "it is the intent of the Legislature that state office facilities be developed in close proximity to the State Capitol Building in Madison." In order to guide the orderly planning and development of these facilities, this same law created the Joint State of Wisconsin—City of Madison Planning Committee, and charged it with the development of a long-range master plan for meeting the general state office facilities requirements in downtown Madison so as to provide efficient and effective government operation.

During the past year the State—City Committee has been engaged in developing a long-range planning guide to provide a direction for the long-range development of state office facilities in Madison. Assisted by the efforts of its staff and its consultant, the firm of Charles Luckman Associates, the committee has—within the context of the legislative mandate for central Madison state offices development—analyzed the most appropriate areas for development, integration of public and private facilities, alternative types of development, the level of facilities potentially required in the long-range future, the scheduling of facilities, and maintaining flexibility for future decisions.

Projections of future office demands, including shortages of nearly 280,000 square feet in 1968, show the need for 440,000 square feet of additional office space by 1972 and 643,000 square feet by 1976. Longer-range projections were also prepared to match first phase construction with potential longer-range development patterns.

While further detailed studies concerning traffic patterns, utilities, and the effect of state offices development on downtown Madison adjacent land use are highly desirable, they can and should be prepared during first phase construction.

The committee has exercised great care to prepare a long-range planning guide that effectively satisfied short-range office facilities requirements, provided full flexibility to ac-

commodate potential long-range needs in an efficient and integrated development, produced significant esthetic qualities at reasonable costs, promotes the efficient operation of state government, and blends the development with the economic, social and community objectives of the City of Madison.

The committee recommends that the 1969 Legislature approve this long-range planning guide as the basis for immediate construction and to offer guidelines to future building decisions made by each legislature.

### Conclusions

1. A legislative mandate directed that the future state office facilities be constructed in the downtown Madison area. While the committee did not directly test that intent, continually throughout its planning efforts the committee found confirmation of the wisdom of that mandate—producing efficient government operations, responsiveness of state departments to legislative directories, and convenience for citizens seeking state service.

2. Severe state office facilities shortages now exist, and promise to grow to even greater dimension in the near future. The committee found these shortages to be well documented, and emphasizes the need to act quickly to correct these shortage problems which sap the efficiency and increase the cost of state government.

3. Greatest emphasis should be given to meeting the shorter-range 1975 state office facilities requirement, within the context of planning these facilities with the flexibility to blend yet further potential construction into an efficient and integrated whole.

4. Legislative control over each state of development must be maintained. In preparing the long-range planning guide for state office facilities development, this was apparent because of:

a. Future potential, significant changes in Federal-State relationships,

b. Changing technology and state administrative methods,

c. Other of the many possible changes which would radically affect the office facility requirements;

The planning guide is developed in a way which would allow for flexibility of growth, and the possibility of a

complete termination of any subsequent development while retaining design integrity of the completed portions.

5. Relating to the planning guide itself, certain relationships which are critical in consideration of physical planning are:

a. The powerful basic axial plan of the street pattern of Madison,

b. The slight recognition of this axial plan in the historical development of the downtown area over the years,

c. The concentration of prime commercial areas in Madison in the one block surrounding the Capitol Square.

d. The fact that the Capitol Square block tax base in terms of assessed evaluations is proportionately a great deal higher than adjacent areas.

6. Madison major traffic patterns should not be disturbed by the state offices development plan. According to Madison traffic policy concepts use of streets within the offices development area as major routes will be eliminated by 1985. Blair Street on the East and Johnson Street on the North, both peripheral streets will remain as major routes. Doty and Wilson Streets on the South will remain rush-hour routes.

7. Based on all of the above conclusions as well as additional planning considerations, the site surrounded on the West by Webster Street, on the East by Blair Street, on the North by Hamilton and Johnson Streets and on the South by King and Wilson Streets is the *only* site within the Central Madison area which will afford sufficient availability of land to provide for contiguous, organized development of state office facilities which relate to one another over the years. East Washington Avenue is preserved as a significant gateway to the State Capitol itself.

8. The tax base in the designated area is relatively low, minimizing possible revenue loss to the city. Based on the consultant's experience around the country, it can reasonably be anticipated that improvement of adjacent properties will bring a four times increase in assessed valuation of these adjacent properties. In this case, there would be an appreciable net gain in tax base for the City of Madison.

9. Transition from rental to owned space in downtown Madison is designed to avoid a serious disruption of the Madison office rental market. The six-year building program

will work toward the elimination at the earliest feasible date of present reliance on expensive, sub-standard, fragmented office space. The shift from the more efficient private rental space to state owned space is expected to be a more gradual one.

Recommendations

1. That the long-range planning guide as reflected in the detailed report and accompanying drawings and photographs be approved as meeting the program needs and the established criteria in a way which will permit biennial phasing of the project, accommodate changes in growth pattern because of the modularity and the flexibility of the plan, and provide efficient office facilities which are in scale with the City of Madison as it exists.

2. That the first increment of construction based on the Master Plan be authorized as soon as possible so that schedules for construction can be met which will provide for the availability of the crucially needed office space at the earliest possible date.

3. That traffic, utilities and land use studies relative to long-range effects and detailed development be undertaken concurrently with initial construction.

4. That land acquisition procedures be established, to assure equity for property holders in the designated area and to protect the state from increases in cost generated by speculation.
