RESOLUTION

Assembly Resolution 20

To create assembly rule 26 (3), relating to a limitation on debate on motions to withdraw proposals from committee.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This resolution proposes to limit debate on motions to withdraw proposals from committee to one 5-minute speech by the member making the motion and 2 other supportive speeches of 2 minutes each and, in opposition to the motion, one 5-minute and 2 2-minute speeches.

Resolved by the assembly, That assembly rule 26 (3) is created to read:

Assembly Rule 26 (3) No member may speak more than once upon a motion to withdraw a proposal from committee and debate upon such a motion shall be limited to the following:

(a) The member making the motion to withdraw may speak for not more than 5 minutes and not more than 2 other members may speak in favor of the motion for not more than 2 minutes each.

(b) In opposition to the motion, one member may speak for not more than 5 minutes and not more than 2 other members may speak for not more than 2 minutes each.
