RESOLUTION

Assembly Resolution 28

To create rule 22m, relating to review by assembly standing committees of the executive budget bill.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This resolution directs certain specified assembly standing committees to review the executive budget bill as it relates to most state agencies (excluded from the review are the 4 constitutional offices, the department of employe trust funds and the investment board) during the period between introduction of the bill and report by joint finance on the bill. The committees shall hold public hearings in connection with their review, and may make any recommendations they deem appropriate to joint finance.

For a list of the committees and the departments which each will review, see the listing in the resolution.

Resolved by the assembly, That:

SECTION 1. This resolution provides for greater participation by the assembly in preliminary review of the governor's recommendations relative to state agencies as expressed in the executive budget bill. The resolution is not designed to cover all areas of state government or all assembly committees, but is intended to provide for review in the major areas of concern.

SECTION 2. Assembly rule 22m is created to read:

Assembly Rule 22m. COMMITTEE REVIEW OF BUDGET BILL. During the period commencing with the introduction of the executive budget bill and ending with the receipt by either house of the recommendation of the joint committee on finance thereon, the committees enumerated below shall review the policy considerations in the executive budget bill relative to the agencies specified below for each committee. The chairman of each committee shall schedule public hearings in connection with the review by his committee, and the committee may recommend to the joint committee on finance such changes in the executive budget bill, within the scope of its study, as it deems appropriate. The committees subject to this rule and the agencies within the scope of their study, are as follows:

- (1) Agriculture: department of agriculture and grain and warehouse commission.
- (2) Commerce and manufactures: public service commission.
- (3) Conservation: department of natural resources.

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(4) **Education:** department of public instruction, coordinating council for higher education, higher educational aids board, historical society, board of regents of state universities, board of regents of the university of Wisconsin and board of vocational, technical and adult education.

(5) **Excise and fees:** department of regulation and licensing.

(6) **Highways:** department of transportation.

(7) **Insurance and banking:** offices of the commissioners of banking, insurance, savings and loan and securities.

(8) **Judiciary:** department of justice and judicial branch agencies.

(9) **Labor:** department of industry, labor and human relations and employment relations commission.

(10) **Municipalities:** department of local affairs and development:

(11) **Public welfare:** department of health and social services.

(12) **State affairs:** department of administration.

(13) **Taxation:** department of revenue.

(14) **Tourism:** department of natural resources.

(15) **Transportation:** department of transportation.

(16) **Veterans' and military affairs:** departments of military affairs and of veterans affairs.
