APPENDIX TO ASSEMBLY BILL 301

(Introduced by Assemblymen Steinhilber and Anderson.)
An act to amend 66.906 (1b) of the statutes, relating to the retirement date for county judges.

Purpose of Bill

The purpose of this bill is to amend Section 66.906 (1b) of the statutes which would provide for the extension of the compulsory retirement age for county judges. At present a county judge, included under the Wisconsin Retirement Fund, ceases to hold office and must be retired at the end of

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the month in which he attains the age of 70 years. This bill would allow county judges to remain in office until July 31 following the date on which the age of 70 years is attained. There are presently 121 county judges in the State of Wisconsin.

Actuarial Effect on Retirement System

The enactment of this bill would have no actuarial effect upon the Wisconsin Retirement Fund.

Probable Cost

The State is required to pay the annual salary of all county judges and it is immaterial whether or not a judge is required to retire on the last day of the month that he reaches the age of 70 or the July 31 following the date on which he reaches the age of 70. The State pays the monthly salary for a judge, or his replacement, should the judge retire.

Section 66.903 (2) (f) 5 of the statutes reads as follows: "No participating employe shall make normal contributions with respect to such earnings paid in any period subsequent to the end of the calendar quarter year in which he attains the age of 63 years if he is a protective occupation employe, or the age of 70 years otherwise, and there shall be no municipality contribution for the service for which the earnings were paid. Effective for participating earnings paid on or after July 1, 1974, no protective occupation participant shall make normal contributions with respect to such earnings for service in any period subsequent to the end of the calendar quarter year in which he attains the age of 58 years, and there shall be no municipality contribution for the service for which such earnings were paid". In other words service for retirement purposes along with employe and employer contributions will cease at the end of the calendar quarter year in which a county judge attains the age of 70. Under the provisions of this section two additional months of service credit for retirement purposes is the maximum a county judge could earn if this bill is passed. Consequently, this bill would not result in any increased cost to the State.

Public Policy Involved

Generally speaking the workload of a court is spread over a judicial year, which coincides in many respects to a fiscal

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year. Within the State of Wisconsin all circuit court judges and supreme court justices are required to retire on the July 31st following attainment of age 70. It would appear logical to standardize the treatment for all judges by establishing the same compulsory retirement date for county judges.

It is very difficult to determine how many judges might be affected by this bill. There are 121 county judges at present, but in order to benefit from this bill they would have to reach age 70 during a term of office. Many of them may leave the bench prior to that age for a variety of reasons, the most important of which is failure to be re-elected. Under this bill a county judge could serve a maximum of nearly one year longer than at present. Many judges would, of course, have their terms extended for a much shorter period.

Recommendation

In view of the fact that this bill attempts to correct a problem confronting the administration of county courts, as it pertains to compulsory retirement of county judges, standardizes the compulsory retirement provisions of all judges under the Wisconsin Retirement Fund and would not result in any increased cost to the State, it is the opinion of this Committee that passage of this bill would be in the best public interest.
