Re: Resolution Concerning Medicare and Medicaid Programs

Enclosed is a copy of a Resolution recently adopted by the Nebraska Legislature. Copies have been sent to the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, and to the Nebraska Congressional Delegation. We are also sending copies to the Governors and Legislatures of the other states, and to the heads of the Welfare Departments.

This Resolution reflects the growing concern in Nebraska with regard to the rising costs of the Medicare and Medicaid programs, especially the latter, and the resulting financial obligations borne by the states. It is felt that the law should be amended by Congress to allow the states more flexibility in the provision of benefits under these programs. This is especially needed in those provisions relating to the scope of the services offered by the states. Under present law, states may not reduce the level of their services, indeed must broaden them, or risk the loss of federal funds.

We are aware that officials in other states have expressed similar concern. It is hoped that through joint action of

the states, Congress can be prevailed upon to amend the law in the manner mentioned above.

Public Policy Involved

The bill is undesirable as a matter of public policy for the following reasons:

It excludes renters; it extends credit only to the higher homestead income people as they are the only ones with an income tax liability to offset thus extending the benefit to those least in need of the benefits; the cost of adminis-

The bill is undesirable as a matter of public policy. It is discriminatory in that it shifts a portion of costs of government to those taxpayers who are independent in political thought. The bill has a further deficiency in that it does not provide a source of revenue to offset the loss to the state and its political subdivisions.

APPENDIX TO ASSEMBLY BILL 333

Public Policy Involved

This is a proposal to grant an exemption to a single association in the state known as the Rock River Thresheree Association. The association owns 101 acres of land in the town of Fulton, Rock county. Section 70.11 (4) of the statutes provides for the exemption of domestic incorporated historical societies but not to exceed 10 acres of land necessary for location and convenience of buildings while such property is not used for profit. If the Rock River Thresheree

Association can qualify under the terms of this section which is the requirement of other historical societies this legislation is not necessary.

A proposal to grant an exemption up to 120 acres is contrary to limits placed on historical societies by the legislature and is therefore undesirable as a matter of public policy. It opens the door for other organizations presently qualified under §70.11 (4), that have the 10 acre limit, to ask for greater acreage exemption.
