COMMUNICATIONS

RESOLUTION RECOMMENDING DEFEAT OF SENATE  
BILL 249, THE TARR TASK FORCE BILL

Whereas, Senate Bill 249, commonly known as the Tarr Task Force bill, would discard or drastically change the time-tested formulae for distributing the local municipal share of the income tax, individual and corporate, the utility tax, and certain other taxes and fees, and

Whereas, The Wisconsin Department of Revenue has reported that the change would reduce the City of Cudahy's share of said taxes by \$331,189.00 per year, and

Whereas, this loss would occur at a time when Cudahy's needs and costs are sharply rising, and the local state and federal burden on Cudahy taxpayers is severely increasing, and

Whereas, the research done by the Tarr committee was incomplete and inadequate; it did not include or weigh the efficiency of the various local governments; and therefore a comparison of Milwaukee tax rates and Cudahy tax rates by itself is meaningless and unfair, and

Whereas, the Tarr committee ignored the fact that foremost complainant for relief, the City of Milwaukee, has spurned available sources of revenue: it has kept its rate of return on its water utility at 3.88% instead of the 6% allowed by the Public Service Commission; it has refused to sell water wholesale to eastern Waukesha County although the Citizens Governmental Research Bureau has estimated that it would earn 24 millions in 15 years if it did so; it has shelved a study by a nationally recognized engineering firm showing that it would save 2.4 millions a year by streamlining its labor force; and its annual wage increases have been so generous (7 million in 1968) that they approximately equal the amount that would be derived from the Tarr plan, and

Whereas, the Tarr formula in substance provides that in addition to a payment of \$30.00 per capita to each municipality, the state will pay a bonus based largely upon the amount that the municipal tax rate exceeds \$20.00 per thousand; the Tarr plan thus equates profligacy with need, and last year would have paid such a municipality 35% of the excess over \$20.00 per thousand; the plan thus would encourage municipalities to pay for capital improvements

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out of current revenues, to obtain such state aids, rather than to hold the tax rate down by spreading the cost of such improvements over a period of years by bond issue, and

Whereas, it appears that the Tarr formula is erratic and unpredictable, making sound municipal financial planning virtually impossible; for example, West Allis would have gained over \$442,000.00 under the plan in 1966, but would have lost \$1,661.00 in 1968.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Cudahy Chamber of Commerce that it hereby respectfully submits to the members of the legislature of the State of Wisconsin that **Senate Bill 249** should be defeated.

Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution go forward to State Senator Leland S. McParland, State Assemblyman William P. Atkinson and to the Clerks of the Senate and Assembly.

To the Honorable, the Legislature:

I have today signed **Assembly Bill 4** (Chapter 90), and deposited it in the office of the Secretary of State.

Recent advances in medical science, many of them spectacular, have called attention to the need for a change in the law regarding gifts of bodies and parts of bodies at death. These advances, coupled with the skill of surgeons and the humanitarian generosity of donors, have opened vistas on the medical horizon beyond the dreams of just a few years ago. The promise of restored health, the extension of life, the gift of sight, is within our grasp, as demonstrated by the successful transplantations of kidneys, corneas, bone marrow, and even hearts, in Wisconsin.

The availability of donors will determine the number of people who will benefit from these new techniques. We need enactment of legislation which will clarify the law, make such gifts easier, and remove uncertainty for donors and physicians, particularly with respect to gifts of body parts for transplantation.

Because of the life-saving implications of such legislation, I am pleased to sign **Assembly Bill 4**. It is my hope that many will choose to take advantage of this extraordinary

opportunity to make a gift of improved health or even life to others.

Although I believe that this act will substantially improve the status of the law in Wisconsin, I must express my regret that it is not uniform. In its original form, as introduced, it corresponded exactly to the "Uniform Anatomical Gift Act." A survey indicates that 30 of 35 states, including 23 which have completed final enactment, have made no substantial changes in the original draft.

The Wisconsin amendments permit relatives to revoke the donor's gift of his entire body under some circumstances. While revocation does not apply to body parts, this departure from the uniform act will, in addition to frustrating the wishes of the donor, lead to some uncertainty for physicians. Uniformity is essential because, with our highly mobile population, the state of execution of the gift may not be the state where death occurs, or even residence of the donor. With uniformity, uncertainty as to the applicable law would be eliminated.

For these reasons, I strongly urge the Legislature to consider restoring uniformity to the act.
