### Assembly Resolution 9

To create assembly rule 13m, relating to eating, drinking, smoking and reading newspapers in the chambers during legislative session.

This proposal prohibits members and officers from consuming foods and beverages, smoking and reading newspapers in the chambers during legislative sessions.

*Resolved by the assembly,* That Assembly rule 13m is created to read:

**RULE 13m. READING, SMOKING AND DRINKING DURING SESSION.** No member or officer of the assembly shall read newspapers, smoke or consume food or beverages in the assembly chambers while in session.

### Assembly Resolution 10

To create assembly rule 13n, relating to wearing coats while the assembly is in session.

**Assembly Resolution 12**

Requesting an opinion of the attorney general as to the constitutionality of 1971 Assembly Bill 212 regarding "federal" elections.

*Resolved by the assembly,* That the attorney general is requested to render an opinion to the assembly at an early date in regard to the constitutionality of the creation of a statute, s. 5.02 (1m) establishing a definition for "federal election" to encompass all primaries and elections held in Wisconsin for federal office, in light of recent federal court decisions enfranchising 18-year-old voters. The attorney general is further specifically requested to express his views on whether or not the Wisconsin presidential preference primary should be deemed to be a federal election.
