REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON TAX EXEMPTIONS

ASSEMBLY BILL 133

Public Policy Involved

This proposal is not desirable as a matter of public policy. Recent federal income tax law changes have made losses by gentlemen farmers more difficult to offset against other income. Moreover, the proposal would discriminate against the legitimate farmer who supplements his income from another source, by refusing to allow him to offset any farm loss against any other income. Someone with the same total gross income derived from two non-farm businesses would be able to offset a loss in one against a profit in the other.

REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON TAX EXEMPTIONS

ASSEMBLY BILL 134

Public Policy Involved

This is desirable as a matter of public policy. The Homestead Relief Act permits one claimant to file a claim for property tax relief against the property taxes he paid. The law assumes that this claimant will be the head of the household and that he will have paid all the property taxes due on the property, but this need not be so in the case of brothers, or brother and sister, or even unrelated persons who due to force of circumstances share the cost of a homestead on some permanent basis. Under the present law, only one of these persons may file a claim and then only for the portion of the property tax he paid on his share of the property. Thus a portion of the tax relief, based on total property taxes paid, is lost. This proposal corrects that inequity.
