REPORTS OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON TAX EXEMPTIONS

Assembly Bill 306

Public Policy Involved

This proposal is not desirable as a matter of public policy. The present homestead tax relief formula relates total income, taxable or not to property taxes or rentals paid. This proposal would distort the formula by subtracting from in-

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come the first \$1,500 of social security payments. A wiser course of action would be to liberalize the formula, rather than tamper with its component parts.

Assembly Bill 434

Public Policy Involved

Wisconsin adopted a general sales tax law recently, under which a tax applies to most retail sales, with a certain few categories exempted. The state has come to rely on this tax as a major revenue source. This proposal would result in a substantial decrease in revenue from sales tax without proposing alternative sources to offset the anticipated loss. For this reason this bill is undesirable as a matter of public policy.

Assembly Bill 592

Public Policy Involved

This bill is addressed to an important matter of public policy—one on which it is plausible to bring the tax power to bear. However, in its present form the bill does not state sufficient procedural standards for fair and effective administration by local assessors and the Department of Revenue. The proposal fails to stipulate who shall determine, or how they shall determine, that a policy of discrimination is in effect or that discrimination is being practiced; how periods in which discrimination is practiced relate to taxing years; how an organization could appeal from an original finding against it; or how an organization once denied a tax exemption could regain it. Until these and similar administrative questions are dealt with, we cannot report favorably on this bill.
