JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON TAX EXEMPTIONS

Assembly Bill 902

The primary purpose of the real estate transfer fee law is to provide state and local assessors with information on established values of real property transferred. This proposal would eliminate needed data on property passing between businesses and their owners, to the detriment of good property tax administration. This bill is not desirable as a matter of public policy.

Because of the constitutional questions raised above, and since certain problems have been experienced by other states having similar programs, this committee is unable to give these bills an approving recommendation at this time. Assembly Bill 965

Other businesses, such as restaurants, department stores, auto repair shops, dry cleaners, etc., must pay taxes on their purchases of equipment and upon their sales of goods and services. There is no good reason to single out photographers and grant them an exemption not available to numerous other commercial enterprises. This proposal is undesirable as a matter of public policy.

Since this proposal raises constitutional questions (above), and because it would grant retired teachers preferential treatment not afforded other persons who moved into this state following retirement, this bill is undesirable as public policy.

Assembly Bill 1056

This bill would have no determinable impact on state revenues or state aids (since it requires that dual records be maintained). Also, it represents an attempt to encourage the highest and best use of land, as well as a possible alternative to the ordinary property tax. For these reasons, the proposal has certain merit.

However, in view of the constitutional questions raised above, and since the state is responsible both for its citizens and for its political subdivisions, this committee cannot give this bill an approving recommendation at this time. It is therefore recommended that this bill and its concept be studied by an interim committee of the Legislative Council in conjunction with the subject matter contained in Assembly Joint Resolution 92.

Assembly Bill 1166

This measure would remove an exemption originally extended to horses and mules when they were primarily a beast of burden—used for work on the farm, and for transportation off it. However, that is no longer the case.

Horses are now principally used for recreational purposes. Since the exemption's initial intent is no longer valid, this bill is desirable as public policy.

Assembly Joint Resolution 73

This is not desirable public policy. Should this amendment be passed Wisconsin would be well on the way toward a system of classified assessments which would provide for different treatment for different kinds of property, thereby abandoning the rule of uniformity. Inevitably administrative problems will become multiplied and equity considerations will become confused. Partial exemptions will impose heavier taxes on remaining taxable property, already heavily burdened. In addition, Wisconsin's homestead tax relief pro-
