SENATE RULE 12m. RECORDING SENATE PRO-CEEDINGS. The members, officers or employes of the senate, the press and all other news media may record by the use of any electronic, mechanical or other device the proceedings of the senate unless otherwise prohibited by a majority vote of the senate body.
