REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

Appendix to Senate Bill 787

Recommendation

An analysis of the duties performed by narcotic and dangerous drug investigators shows that their positions do involve active law enforcement and frequent exposure to a high degree of danger and peril. Thus, it would appear that these positions do fulfill the criteria contained in S. 41.02 (11) of the statutes necessary for classification in the Wisconsin Retirement Fund as protective occupation participants, and that they should be so designated. It is the opinion of this committee that *passage of Senate Bill 787 is in the best public interest.*

Appendix to Senate Bill 844

Recommendation

This bill is an example of special interest legislation and without knowing the exact number of persons involved it is very difficult to accurately determine its cost to the employer. It definitely subverts present retirement philosophy and could very well open the door to future special interest legislation. Therefore, it is the feeling of this committee that *passage of this bill would not be in the best public interest.*

Appendix to Senate Bill 880

Recommendation

The bill provides special treatment for a particular group of 17 Milwaukee state circuit judges. These proposed benefits are considerably greater than the benefits provided to the other 34 circuit judges. The legality of utilizing the

\$21,000 state statutory salary for computation of retirement benefits from two separate systems at the same time should be determined.

An increased annual cost to the County of Milwaukee of approximately \$97,000 to provide these increased benefits for 17 circuit judges seems excessive. In addition, the bill will create additional inequities to the judiciary as a whole and enactment is inappropriate as long as the Governor's "Citizens Study Committee on Judicial Organizations" is still actively studying this matter. Therefore, it is the opinion of this committee that *passage of this bill is not in the best public interest.*
