Resolved, That the Wisconsin Legislature expresses its deepest sorrow to those who have suffered because of the war, particularly to the families of those Americans who shall not return home; and be it further

Resolved, that the Wisconsin Legislature commends those who bore the harsh burdens of the war; and be it further

Resolved, That the Wisconsin Legislature commends those courageous individuals who were forced to bear undue vilification as they sought to honorably resolve the Vietnam conflict to the best of their abilities; and be it further

Resolved that duly attested copies of this resolution be transmitted to President Richard M. Nixon and to the members of the Wisconsin Congressional delegation.
