Appendix to Senate Bill 254

Public Policy Involved

Under current law, trees, vines and bushes are subject to general property taxes but their fruit is exempt. The portion which is taxed is a more or less permanent item, and is not comparable to exempt "growing crops" and nursery stock which are grown for sale or replanting at other locations. Horticultural trees, vines and bushes

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are decidedly part of a property's value whether for assessment or for sale. This bill is undesirable as public policy.

Public Policy Involved

Restaurants, unlike bakeries and wholesale food processors, are ordinarily considered retail businesses -- not manufacturers. Other similar retail businesses, such as photographic studios, department stores, auto repair shops and dry cleaners, must pay a sales and use tax on purchases of their equipment. It would be inappropriate and discriminatory to single out restaurants and grant them an exemption not available to numerous other commercial retail enterprises. This bill is undesirable as public policy.
