State of Wisconsin Office of the Governor Madison, Wisconsin

February 27, 1976.

To the Honorable, the Senate:

Over the last few months, most of the controversy surrounding Wisconsin's delegate selection process has centered on the open primary question. However, there are two other areas that stand between the state and full compliance with the requirements of the Democratic National Committee. Now, legislation has been drafted to eliminate those secondary obstacles, and I would urge the legislature to give it prompt attention.

The legislation will allow Wisconsin political parties to select delegates by proportional representation instead of on a "winner take all" basis. The bill also will ensure that the size of the convention delegation from each Wisconsin congressional district will be determined by the Strength of the Democratic or Republican vote in each district, rather than be divided equally among the nine districts.

As you know, I will be going to Washington, D.C., March 5th to present Wisconsin's case to the Compliance Review Commission. I will urge them to find that Wisconsin has made a "good faith" effort to comply with the party's rules and to permit Wisconsin's Democrats to choose their convention delegates in 1976 as they have in the past -- in an open primary rather than in a caucus. The approval of this legislation will reinforce our argument that Wisconsin's Democrats have made that good faith effort.
