A Proclamation

Increasing the housing value limitations for the veterans home loan program to \$52,500 on or after June 13, 1978, and to \$55,000 after January 1, 1979.

REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON

RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

Appendix to Senate Bill 1, Special Session

Recommendation

The Joint Survey Committee on Retirement Systems is concerned only with the provisions of this bill which relate to retirement matters. The Committee finds that the retirement provisions provide greater benefit uniformity and consolidation for future judges, thus reflecting a continuation of legislative retirement policy. The transitional benefit provisions have been designed to protect the interests and contractual rights of court personnel who are affected by the establishment of a single trial level court. The optional rights granted for court personnel reflect procedures previously adopted by the legislature in other public employment reclassifications and retirement mergers. The Committee finds that the retirement provisions generally reflect good public policy, but requests that the legislature review the several areas of concern noted in the public policy statement of this report.
