Dear Mr. Speaker:

I am writing on behalf of The Hunger Project to invite the Wisconsin State Assembly to join in one minute's silent contemplation of a world without hunger and starvation, on Thursday, February 14 at 11:00 a.m., Madison time. A number of public schools, including several in Madison and Milwaukee, and other groups throughout the country will be honoring this moment of silence.

I would also like to take this opportunity to share some background information on The Hunger Project with you and the State Assembly. This Thursday, February 14, marks the third anniversary of the conception of The Hunger Project - an international, non-profit group of individuals dedicated to making the end of starvation on our planet by 1997 an idea whose time has come. The Hunger Project works largely through an awareness and enrollment process in which individuals take personal responsibility for making the end of starvation an idea whose time has come. To date, over 1 million individuals have made this commitment, and are participating in a wide variety of activities consistent with this end.

The Hunger Project is represented on the Presidential Commission on World Hunger and the U.S. Consultation Group on Hunger, and has participated in the World Food Conference in Rome. We have also sponsored symposia on ending hunger and starvation, and have met with leaders and scientists from England, India, Costa Rica, Mexico, Austria and other countries. In response to the urgency of

the Cambodian situation, The Hunger Project advertised in several major newspapers, raising \$880,000 for other hunger organizations which were able to get food and medical supplies into Cambodia. We continue to encourage the public to respond to appeals for aid to Cambodia, and other countries experiencing famine.

I am enclosing some additional information on The Hunger Project, including a list of our Advisory Council and Board of Directors, A Brief Summary of Information, and two of our newsletters, *The Shift in the Wind*, which has a circulation of over 1 million. I also want to acknowledge you for your willingness to share this opportunity for shared contemplation of a world without hunger with our State Assembly. Thank you.
