**Noes --** Senators Adelman, Berger, Engeleiter, Frank, George, Hanaway, Harnisch, Johnston, Kleczka, Lasee, Lorge, Lorman, Moody, Offner, Risser, Strohl and Theno -- 17.

Absent or not voting -- Senators Braun and Maurer -- 2.

So the amendment failed to be non-concurred in.

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The question was: Concurrence of assembly amendment 16?

The ayes and noes were demanded and the vote was: ayes, 21; noes, 10; absent or not voting, 2; as follows:
