### State of Wisconsin Claims Board

The State Claims Board conducted hearings at the State Capitol Building, Madison, Wisconsin, on May 24, 1982, upon the following claims:

Claimant	Amount
Ronald Harris	\$600.00
Nancy Miller	316.16
Michael Mahler	104.00

### THE BOARD FINDS:

1. Ronald Harris of Milwaukee claims \$600 for the alleged failure of the Department of Transportation to note his lien on the title of an automobile originally owned by claimant. On April 21, 1981, claimant sold the automobile under an agreement with the purchaser to receive payment of \$600 by May 30, 1981. It was subsequently determined that the Department of Transportation omitted claimant's lien on the title of the automobile and the purchaser of the automobile could not be located. The Board concludes the claim should be paid, based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes that under the authority of s. 16.007 (6m), Stats., payment of this claim shall be made from the Department of Transportation appropriation s. 20.395(5)(cq), Stats.

2. Nancy Miller of Waunakee claims \$306.80 because of damage to her coat as the result of an ink stain and \$9.36 for a cleaning bill in an attempt to remove the stain from the coat. The ink stain was incurred on December 1, 1981, while claimant was picking up her office keys in the Computer Room at the Wilson Street State Office Building. The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$50, based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes that under the authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment of this claim shall be made from the Department of Health & Social Services appropriation s. 20.435(8)(k), Stats.

3. Michael Mahler of Milwaukee claims \$104.00 for a tape recorder which was stolen from his home by Ronnie Lee Jackson in

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April, 1977. Upon a finding of guilty to the charge of burglary of claimant's home, Mr. Jackson was placed on probation by Milwaukee County Circuit Court Judge Holz, under the provisions of the Youthful Offender Law. Judge Holz ordered Mr. Jackson to pay restitution to claimant as part of his probation. Claimant received \$20 from Mr. Jackson. Mr. Jackson failed to make the remaining restitution payments and because of an administrative error his probation was not extended. The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$100, based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes under the authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment of this claim should be made from the Department of Health & Social Services appropriation s. 20.435(3) (a), Stats.

### THE BOARD CONCLUDES:

1. Payment of the following amounts to the following claimants is justified under s. 16.007, Stats.:

Ronald Harris	\$600.00
Nancy Miller	50.00
Michael Mahler	100.00
