REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

Appendix to Senate Bill 116

Public Policy Involved

This legislation is similar to Senate Bill 147 that was considered during the 1981 session. That bill was referred to the Joint Survey committee on Retirement Systems (JSCRS) for analysis, and the Committee recommended that provisions in that legislation affecting public employees and employers of the state be deleted to allow further study. The legislation did not pass during the 1981 session, and the issue was reviewed by the Retirement Research Committee (RRC) in October, 1982. However, the Research Committee has made no specific recommendation to date relative to the removal of the age 70 limitation on involuntary retirement restrictions now provided by both state and Federal law.

Mandatory or involuntary retirement is often construed to be primarily a personnel matter. On the other hand, it is relatively common to find such provisions within the framework of retirement plans rather than personnel laws or rules. Concerning the state-administered WRS, Ch. 40 of the Stats. provides under s. 40.23 (l)(f) that any participant may be retired by the employer after attaining the employee's "normal retirement date" under policies established or agreed to by the employer, unless prohibited by Federal law or collective bargaining agreement. This bill would specifically amend this section of WRS law to include the added restrictions newly provided under the state FAIR Employment Act.

The Federal Age Discrimination in Employment law restricting involuntary retirement between ages 40 and 70 has been in effect since 1978. In recognition of the Federal law, the state and most governmental subdivisions have adopted policies of providing no involuntary or mandatory retirement before age 70, unless for just cause. The exception to this general statement relates to protective participants under the WRS for whom some employers are attempting to mandate retirement at an earlier age. For other public employees at the local level, mandatory retirement is in some instances required by collective bargaining agreements or city and county ordinances at age 70. This bill would allow a temporary delay in the restrictions on involuntary retirement in these instances. During the hearings on Senate Bill 147 during the 1981 session, very little concern was noted by public employers or their associations. In general, it would seem that neither the public employers or public employee groups within this state are greatly concerned as to personnel problems that might occur if this legislation is enacted. Presumably, it is the general belief that few employees will avail themselves of the right to stay in employment after age 70.
