REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON DEBT MANAGEMENT

Appendix to Senate Bill 83

Public Policy Involved

The borrowing-related provisions of Senate Bill 83, the proposed borrowing for the 1983-85 State Building Program, modifications to the 1979-81 and 1981-83 Building Programs and, if adopted by the joint committee on Finance, the increase in borrowing limits for the Health Facilities Authority, are desirable as a matter of public policy.

The committee is aware that requests have been made to the joint committee on Finance for bonding for economic development and export loans, but makes no comment on the appropriateness or desirability of these proposals, since it understands that the joint committee on Finance will not include any of those proposals in Senate Bill 83.

Senate Bill 83 authorizes \$201,400,000 of revenue obligations for transportation facilities and highways. This amount should be reduced to reflect the actions of the Building Commission which reduce the amount requested for transportation facilities by \$294,600.

Also, as drafted, Sections 133,145,146,438 and 476 of Senate Bill 83, which relate to various appropriations for proceeds of revenue bond issues, are technically incorrect. These sections should be redrafted to include references to (a) the funds created under s. 18.57(1), Stats., for proceeds of the bond issues, (b) the statutory authority for the programs and (c) using the proceeds for reserves and expenses or issuance and management of the bond issues.

It should also be noted that this report has been adopted prior to adoption of the committee's policies on state debt and on revenue obligations. The committee, based on testimony from bond analysts, is in the process of revising its policies, that were adopted in 1981.

The committee is considering recommending limits on the amount of state-level borrowing for the 1983-85 biennium. These limits relate both to the limitations imposed by the bond market on the amounts of state bonds that can be sold and to the ability of the citizens of this state to support the debt service on the bonds. Careful management of state borrowing and the amount and timing of state borrowing will affect the response of the bond market to state bond issues.
