Chapter 39.11(17m) Wis. Stats., states that the Educational Communications Board shall:

Maintain annual records of its expenditures for programming purposes by type of programming and by source of revenue. By December 1, 1983, and annually thereafter, the Educational Communications Board shall report to the Governor and the Legislature all of the board's sources of revenue by source and amount.

Since the year to be reported is not specified, the ECB interprets the intent to mean the previous fiscal year. Therefore, in accordance with 39.11(17m) the audited financial statements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1983, for the Wisconsin Educational Television Network and the Wisconsin Educational Radio Network operated by the Educational Communications Board are hereby submitted.

To the Honorable the Senate

A new section of the statutes, sec. 165.91, Stats., was created with the passage of the 1983-85 budget bill to provide aid for cooperative county-tribal law enforcement programs. Paragraph 165.91(3) specifies that annually, by January 15, the Department of Justice shall report to the Legislature and Governor on the performance of these programs and on the value of such a program to other counties and tribes. This letter, then, is the report for 1984.

The new section provides that a county-tribal organization can apply for \$20,000 of state aid by submitting a plan to the Department of Justice. The plan must cover several points outlined in the statute and \$5,000 local matching funds have to be identified. A plan is eligible only if a county-tribal law enforcement program was in effect on January 1, 1983. Two plans qualified: Shawano County-Stockbridge Munsee Council and Bayfield County-Red Cliff Council. The law further states that these programs sunset after July 1, 1986.

Shawano County-Stockbridge Munsee Council

The plan from this organization was approved on September 12, 1983 and \$20,000 was forwarded to Shawano County on September 28, 1983. The plan called for the employment of a deputy sheriff assigned to the reservation who would live on or near the reservation. This position has been filled and it has also been possible to employ a part-time deputy. Originally there were some work schedule problems but Sheriff James Knope reports that these have been resolved and is pleased that the program is relieving some of the burden placed on his office. The Tribal Council is exploring ways to enhance the program if other funding sources can be found, but they too are pleased with initial progress.

Bayfield County-Red Cliff Council

This plan was submitted in September, 1983, and approved in October. A check was mailed on November 1, 1983. The proposal called for employing a Native American as a certified deputy sheriff who would be assigned to the reservation and live there. The deputy began employment on November 29, 1983, and enough funds are also available for a part-time officer. Sheriff Fredericks and representatives of the Council agree that the program is up and running well although only about six weeks old.

While both programs seem to be running smoothly now, they have been in operation only a few weeks and it is not yet possible to evaluate their effectiveness. Sometime in the next six to nine months, the Department of Justice will audit the programs to determine adequacy of financial records, law enforcement functions being performed and other aspects of the original plans. By the time of the next annual report in January, 1985, we will

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be able to provide a more comprehensive evaluation and discuss the value of these aids for other counties and tribes.
