Public Policy Involved

This bill is good public policy. It is suggested that the standing committees which later review this bill adopt an amendment that clearly limits the maximum annual retirement benefit exemption to \$6,000 per person regardless of how many retirement plans a person receives benefits from. In addition, it is suggested that the term "retirement system," as used in the bill, be more clearly defined. As currently drafted, it is not clear whether amounts received under retirement plans such as individual retirement accounts (IRA's) would be exempt under the bill. It is also suggested that the retirement benefit exemption provided by this bill be limited to persons whose household income does not exceed such specified dollar amounts as are determined to be appropriate by the standing committees.
