THE BOARD FINDS:

- Gabriel Ware, Jr. of Milwaukee claims \$118,026.00 for an alleged loss of worker's compensation benefits relating to an injury he sustained at the Schlitz Brewery Company on June 30, 1970, where he was employed. His workmen's compensation claim was decided on March 26, 1976, with a finding that as a result of his injury claimant was temporarily totally disabled from July 6, 1970 to October 19, 1970 and from October 22, 1970 to November 25, 1970 and that he sustained no permanent disability as a result of the accident of June Claimant alleges that the workmen's compensation decision was in error as a result of a fraudulent picture film that was admitted as an exhibit. A surveillance of the claimant was conducted in 1971 and a film was taken on September 28, 1971 at the request of Aetna Insurance Company, the insurer of Schlitz Brewery Company. The film showed a man alleged to be the claimant changing a tire of an automobile. Claimant alleges that the person shown on the film was not him, but his son. The issue of the film has been adjudicated through several proceedings and this Board cannot now second guess the authenticity of the film. The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.
- 2. Joseph Weinbauer of Glenbeulah claims \$1,369.00 for the cost of a property survey, attorney fees, telephone calls, time and mileage incurred as a result of a boundary dispute concerning land located in the Town of Greenbush, Sheboygan County, in October, 1981. The dispute arose after Department of Natural Resources forestry personnel marked a small tract of property for a fuelwood sale. In an attempt to resolve the dispute, claimant arrange for a survey to be conducted. The Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$1,000, based on equitable principles which appears to be in line with the Department of Natural Resources' desire to amicably settle the matter with a land trade. The Board further concludes under authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Natural Resources appropriation s. 20.370(1)(mu), Stats.
- 3 10. The following claimants allege they did not receive the pay to which they were entitled under their contracts of employment with the University of Wisconsin LaCrosse for the 1982-83 academic year. Each of the claimants was employed at the University during the 1981-82 fiscal year and were employed as of May 1, 1982. During the months of May, June and July, 1982, each of the claimants received a letter of appointment to an academic staff position in the unclassified civil service at the University for the 1982-83 year. The salary amounts set out in the letters of appointment represented increases to each of the

claimants over their salaries for the preceding year in the amount of 8%. However, an amendment to the state biennial budget, Chapter 317, Laws of 1981, Section 2057(2)(a), effective May 1, 1982, provided that "no state employe in the unclassified service may receive any increase in salary over the rate paid to that employe on the effective date of this act for the purpose of any general economic adjustment, discretionary performance award, regrade, merit increase or other similar purpose prior to October 3, 1982, or the beginning of the payroll period of each employe closest to that date." The University then advised the claimants in letters dated August 4, 1982, that they would continue to be paid at their 1981-82 rate of pay for the first two and one-half months of service in 1982-83. The University alleges that it was initially unclear as the the treatment of the claimants under the budget amendment because they were employed under a series of one year contracts. The Board concludes on the basis of this unique situation where the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse made an error in notifying claimants of higher salary amounts in spite of Chapter 317, Laws of 1981, that these claims should be paid in the amounts set forth below, based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes under authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the University of Wisconsin appropriation s. 20.285(1)(a), Stats., except the claim of William Campbell which should be paid from s. 20.285(1)(n), Stats.

- George Drinkwater of Milwaukee claims \$250,000.00 for pain, suffering and disability allegedly incurred as the result of a surgery performed at the University Hospital on September 9, 1980. During exploratory surgery performed on claimant's right hip, a drill bit broke off inside the hip. The doctor performing the surgery determined that surgical removal of the bit should not be undertaken because it would prolong the operation and unnecessarily increase the risks of surgical and post-operative complications. X-rays taken of claimant's hip in 1980 and 1982, showed no evidence of irritation or any reaction to the drill bit. The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents, or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.
- 12. David Bowman of Oshkosh claims \$390 for medical expenses incurred in 1983 as a result of an error made by the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh, with respect to his health insurance. The Board concludes the claim should be paid based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes under authority of s.

- 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the University of Wisconsin appropriation s. 20.285(1)(a), Stats.
- 13. Max Wiltzius of Trego claims \$583.34 for timber stumpage value and the cost of a land survey associated with a timber sale on land in Washburn County in March, 1983. The Department of Natural Resources forestry personnel established a timber sale boundary between property owned by the Town of Chicog and property owned by claimant. While trees were being cut, claimant disputed the placement of the property line and had a survey conducted at his expense which showed that the timber sale boundary was on his property. Board concludes the claim should be paid in the reduced amount of \$538.00, the amount of the survey costs, based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes under authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Natural Resources appropriation s. 20.370(1)(mu), Stats.
- 14. Leta Freeman of Manitowoc claims \$618.42 for uninsured damages incurred to the interior of her apartment caused by a wild deer on May 18, 1983 and related expenses under unusual circumstances whereby the deer jumped through her living room window. The Board concludes the claim in the reduced amount of \$400 should be paid based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes, under authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Natural Resources appropriation s. 20.370(1)(mu), Stats.
- 15. Hope Quentmeyer of Milwaukee claims \$282.90 for automobile damages incurred as she was driving out of the lot at Taycheedah Correctional Institute where she was employed. On June 2, 1983, as claimant drove through the exit her car allegedly became stuck on the gate guides damaging the car's exhaust system. The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its employes, officers or agents and this claim is not one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.
- 16. Thomas Cornelius of Fox Lake claims \$20.63 as the amount of charges made on his canteen account at the Green Bay Correctional Institute where claimant was incarcerated. Claimant alleges that the canteen goods were charged to his account without his approval or knowledge on December 11, 1982. The claimant filed a complaint with the Institute's Inmate Complaint Review System which found that claimant did receive and sign for canteen goods in the amount of \$20.63 on December 11, 1982. The Board concludes there has been an insufficient showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents, or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.
- 17. Randy Marten of Thorp claims \$2,407.40 for attorney fees incurred for representation in an action to dismiss charges brought against him by Eau Claire County District Attorney, which charges had been previously dismissed by the Clark County District Attorney. Claimant was charged with misdemeanors in

Clark and Eau Claire Counties from the same incident on October 8, 1981. The Clark and Eau Claire County District Attorneys agreed that all charges would be dealt wih in one proceeding in Clark County. Claimant entered a plea of guilty to the first three counts of the Clark County complaint and the Eau Claire County charge were dismissed. The Eau Claire County District Attorney's office subsequently issued a warrant for claimant for the charges relating to the incident on October 8, 1981. Claimant's attorney appealed to the Court of Appeals which issued a decision that Eau Claire County could not prosecute its charges against claimant because they had been part of a plea bargain arranged in Clark County. The Board concludes there has been no showing of negligence on the part of the state, its officers, agents, or employes and this claim is not one for which the state is legally liable nor one which the state should assume and pay based on equitable principles.

18. Trudy Fitzgerald of Racine claims \$12.60 for repair of her wedding ring allegedly necessitated by an accident on October 20, 1983 at the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations Job Service Office in Racine, where claimant is employed. While assisting in moving office partitions another employe pushed a partition against another partition smashing claimant's hand in between the two, causing her wedding ring to split. The Board concludes the claim should be paid based on equitable principles. The Board further concludes under authority of s. 16.007(6m), Stats., payment should be made from the Department of Industry, Labor, and Human Relations appropriation s. 20.445(1)(z), Stats.
