GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE

November 1, 1985

To the Honorable Members of the Assembly:

Throughout the debate on Assembly Bill 473 I expressed my view that legislation to limit civil liability for negligent service of alcoholic beverages should preserve the rule established in two recent Wisconsin Supreme Court decisions. That rule is that commercial and social hosts who provide alcohol to persons they knew or should have known were minors can be held proportionately responsible for injury subsequently caused by those minors. This is sound public policy.

The present bill exempts from liability those providers of alcohol to minors who do not have actual knowledge of the minor's age. The bill rewards willful ignorance of a guest's or patron's age. It is at odds with our licensing statutes which impose on licensees the responsibility for determining the age of their customers. The bill is further deficient in limiting what little liability it imposes to the actual server, rather than extending it to the employer or owner of the premises.

We have recently taken many steps to combat drunk driving and juvenile drinking. While I sympathize with problems faced by commercial hosts, non-profit organizations and others who rely on alcohol sales, legislation intended to address that problem should at least not counter our recent efforts.

I am vetoing AB 473, but I will sign Special Session Senate Bill 1, which does not overturn the Supreme Court decisions with respect to minors but still offers some reasonable protections for providers of alcohol acting prudently and in good faith.

Dear Speaker Loftus:

Pursuant to Assembly Rule 11 (2), I am appointing a subcommittee of the committee on Agriculture to consider the subject of the rights of buyers of farm products. The subcommittee will be chaired by Representative Mary Hubler; the other members are Representatives Barbara Gronemus and Heron Van Gorden.

The charge to the subcommittee is to consider the subject matter of Assembly Bill 429 and Senate Bill 384. Both of these measures seek to modify the law's current balance between the rights of buyers of farm products and the rights of holders of security interests in these products. Because these Bills affect substantial property interests and shift legal burdens among various interest groups, all of whom have meritorious arguments in their favor, the subcommittee is directed to seek a solution which remedies the problems arising under current law and yet is agreeable to the affected interests.

I am asking the subcommittee to complete its work and report to the committee on Agriculture no later than January 17, 1986.
