To the Honorable, the Senate:

As you know, there is no more pressing highway safety issue facing Wisconsin, and the nation, than drunk driving. In this century alcohol related crashes have taken at least 25,000 lives in Wisconsin. If lives are to be saved, new solutions must be found to combat a problem of this magnitude. I am, therefore, pleased to submit this report on Administrative Revocation.

Administrative Revocation is a process that allows a state to quickly revoke the driving privilege of any driver who operates a motor vehicle with a blood alcohol level at or above the legal limit. Both Iowa and Minnesota, as well as 17 other states, have already adopted some form of Administrative Revocation statute.

This analysis, entitled "Administrative Revocation of Drunk Drivers in Wisconsin - A Legislative Report", is divided into two sections. The first section contains the Department's Analysis of Administrative Revocation. The second section consists of 6 Appendices that

document the estimated cost of the program and provide a great deal of information about the experiences of other states that have implemented some form of Administrative Revocation program.
