The 1983-85 Biennial Budget Act mandated a ten percent reduction in the size of the entering class of the UW-Madison Medical School, to be achieved by 1990-91, and required that a report on the financial impact of these reductions be made for review during the 1985-87 Biennial Budget process.

In response to that latter requirement, the Board of Regents adopted the following resolution at its meeting on December 7, 1984:

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison, the report, Implications of a Ten Percent Reduction in Student Enrollment at the Medical School of the UW-Madison, and its recommendation for improving medical education by the reallocation of funds released as a result of the reduction in medical student enrollments be approved and forwarded to the Governor and Legislature in response to s. 36.28 and section 2053(3), 1983 Wisconsin Act 27.

There are several points which should be considered in reviewing the enclosed report:

- (1) Potential savings associated with the required enrollment reductions are somewhat illusory and difficult to identify since costs for much of the instructional program are fixed rather than variable.
- (2) The maximum estimate of savings identified in the report for the 1985-87 biennium is \$57,700.
- (3) The additional dollar amounts estimated in the report also are small and could only be realized over a seven-year period.
- (4) The Medical School budget has been seriously eroded by inflation and weakened by several budget reductions.

It is therefore recommended that any savings which might result from reduced enrollments be retained by the Medical School and reinvested to strengthen physician training.
