To the Honorable, the Senate:

I am pleased to submit the attached proposed plan on an employment initiative for recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) for consideration by the Wisconsin Legislature. This submission is being made pursuant to Section 3023 (26r) of 1985 Act 29.

The Department reviewed employment and training programs from other states, including San Diego Job Search and Work Demonstration Program and the Massachusetts Employment and Training Choices Program. After reviewing various approaches for employment of public assistance recipients, we have developed a plan which builds on those parts of our existing program which are working well, expands services which are currently insufficient in meeting needs, and incorporates new approaches in targeting groups with special needs. At-risk youth, long term recipients, and unemployed two parent cases will be targeted for services. In addition, special programming will be developed for American Indians and persons needing bilingual programs.

The current Wisconsin program - Wisconsin Employment Opportunities Program (WEOP) - has been successful within resources we have available. In 1984-85, over 12,000 job placements were achieved for clients; more than 18,800 AFDC clients actively participated in job search activities; and over 5,500 participated in job training, education and work experience efforts. And this current effort will continue, provided federal funding is maintained.

However, at any one time, no services are available for approximately 40% of the WEOP clients. The plan I am submitting will begin to address that unmet need. The plan provides for direct job placement, on-the-job training for permanent jobs, direct work experience and vocational training and education when needed.

In total, the \$6.3 million earmarked by the Legislature will result in opportunities for some 12,000

clients to be served in work programs and some 6,000 to be served through vocational training and education activities during the 1985-87 biennium.

Specifically, the plan includes a 250% increase in the number of AFDC recipients engaged in on-the-job training and work experience placements; it involves state funding for county administrative costs of model Community Work Experience Programs; it provides over \$2 million to support increased vocational training and education activities; it expands a current department program to increase the employability of "at-risk" AFDC dependents and adolescents; and it extends the current WEOP program into the two unserved counties with the highest AFDC caseloads.

I urge you to give prompt consideration to this proposal and the enactment of the authorizing legislation so that an additional 18,000 Wisconsin AFDC recipients will have access to the employment and training services they need to move from public assistance to unsubsidized employment.
