To the Honorable, the Senate:

In compliance with Section 1, 46.03(5)(c) of Act 474, the following information is provided for your consideration and review and for referral to the appropriate standing committees. The figures below cover the period from January 1, 1985 through December 31, 1985.

1. Five inmates were transferred involuntarily from a prison to a mental health institute under s. 51.20(13)(a)4. Their average length of stay was 128 days. The shortest length of stay was 69 days, the longest, 197 days.

Four other inmates were transferred involuntarily from a prison to a mental health institute under s. 51.37(5). One was still hospitalized as of December 31, 1985, and had been in treatment 37 days. Two others stayed 2 and 4 days respectively. The fourth was hospitalized 81 days.

None inmates were transferred to a mental health institute on a voluntary basis. Three remained hospitalized as of December 31, 1985. They had been at the Institute for 70, 224, and 49 days respectively. Of the remaining six inmates who had been transferred on a voluntary basis, four had relatively short stays averaging 12 days. The other two were hospitalized for 175 and 97 days respectively.

2. Under the provisions of s. 51.20(1)(ar)1.b, one inmate underwent involuntary treatment with Prolixin (an antipsychotic medication) while residing in the Wisconsin Resource Center.

Seven inmates underwent involuntary treatment with psychotropic drugs during their stay in a mental health institute.

Drugs used for involuntary treatment at the Mental Health Centers were anti-psychotics, i.e., Thorazine, Prolixin, Haldol, Navane, and Lithium Carbonate.

469 inmates underwent voluntary treatment with psychotropic drugs while residing in correctional

facilities (prisons or camps). 80 different inmates underwent voluntary treatment with psychotropic drugs while residing in the Wisconsin Resource Center. This constitutes a total of 549 inmates who underwent voluntary treatment.

Two inmates underwent voluntary treatment with psychotropic drugs during their stay in a mental health institute.

The types of drugs used for voluntary treatment were anti-depressants, anti-psychotics, sedatives, and minor tranquilizers.

3. Mental health services available at Mendota Mental Health Institute, Winnebago Mental Health Institute and the Wisconsin Resource Center to inmates transferred on both a voluntary and involuntary basis, where appropriate, are as follows: chemotherapy, sheltered workshops, educational assistance, token economy, individual therapy, behaviorally oriented therapy, and group therapies consisting of occupational, recreational, industrial and family oriented approaches.

Mental health services, both psychiatric and psychological, are available at each of the adult male and female institutions. Services available chemotherapy, individual and group psychotherapy, social skills training, anger control neuropsychological evaluations and crisis intervention. Inmates who need more intensive mental health services are transferred to either the Wisconsin Resource Center or one of the Institutes.
