REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

Appendix to Senate Bill 450

Public Policy Involved .

Present statutes provide a presumption for municipal firefighters that any disability or death resulting from heart or respiratory impairment or disease shall be deemed to be employment-related for purposes of various employee benefit programs. This statutory presumption was first enacted in 1961, and presumably reflected the difficulty of measuring the effects of smoke and poisonous gasses that firefighters encounter during their normal duties. Numerous attempts have been made since 1961 (including 1973, 1975, 1977, and 1983) to establish similar employment presumptions for police officers and other protective-type public employees without success.

There are several disability programs provided by the state-administered WRS. The general disability benefit applies to all participants with five or more years of service, or with no service requirement if the disability is duty-related. The definition of disability under the general program requires that the participant be unable to engage in any substantial gainful activity. A second disability program relates only to protectives who are 50 years of age or older, and requires that the participant be unable to efficiently, and safely perform the duties required under the protective position.

A third disability program under the WRS was enacted during the 1981 session to replace the antiquated death and disability provisions under s. 66.191, 1981 Stats. This new program found under s. 40.65 of the statutes applies to nearly all of the protective participants under the WRS plus a few participants who are not protective. The program relates to employees who are injured while performing their duties resulting in a permanent disability which causes the employee to retire from employment, or requires assignment to light duty. or adversely affects promotional opportunities.

For those qualifying, the benefit under s. 40.65 is 80% of the salary at the time of disability (and indexed), but offset by all other sources of income relating to the participant's employment. Because this program is so new (effective 1/1/82), the costs presently assigned to the

program of 0.2% of covered payroll are estimates only which will be subject to change as experience dictates. It is this WRS program that would be most affected by passage of S.B. 450.

In reviewing this bill, the following points should be considered:

- 1. There is little statistical evidence available to substantiate that municipal police officers and other protective-type public employees have a higher incidence of heart or nervous disorders than the general public.
- 2. A lack of a presumption clause does not prevent municipal police officers and other public employees from claiming that heart or nervous disorders are dutyrelated
- 3. The term "nervous disorder" lacks a clear definition and is an area that may not be reviewed or detected in a pre-employment physical examination.
- 4. The existing employment presumption for firefighters appears to affect the rate of claims for disability benefits. Although firefighters represented only 22% of those eligible for the disability benefits under s. 66.191, 1981 Stats., said firefighters represented 66% of all claims under that program.
- 5. There have been no actuarial studies of the costs involved in this legislation for the WRS or the Milwaukee County Retirement Fund. Also, this bill would affect a WRS disability program that has been in effect only since 1/1/82 and which already has been subject to significant cost increases because of the number of claims that are being made.
- 6. This bill applies to Milwaukee City and County Retirement Funds even though both funds have been granted homerule powers by state statute and/or state constitution.
- 7. This bill affects public employee benefit plans that are currently subject to collective bargaining at the Milwaukee City or County level or through the state Department of Employment Relations.
- 8. This legislation further confuses the definitions of WRS protective employees by newly including some non-protective employees under the new presumption clause and excluding other types of protectives from that presumption clause.
