1 (2) PROGRAMS PREVIOUSLY AUTHORIZED. In addition to the projects and
2 financing authority enumerated under subsection (1), the building and financ-
3 ing authority enumerated under previous authorized state building programs is
4 continued in fiscal years 1987-88 and 1988-89.

5 (3) MINOR PROJECTS. The building commission may establish and modify
6 project priorities for the minor projects funded under subsection (1) and may,
7 within the total funding provided for minor projects under subsection (1),
8 revise the amount of funds allocated among agencies.

9 ••87b1753/2•• (3r) SPACE NEEDS STUDY. The building commission may pro-
10 vide for a study of the space needs of the supreme court, court of appeals,
11 law library, office of director of state courts and related administrative
12 personnel.

13 (4) ALLOCATION AUTHORITY. Notwithstanding section 20.924 (1) of the
14 statutes, the building commission may allocate the financing authority under
15 subsection (1) (n) for the purposes of maintenance, health, safety and
16 environment, energy conservation, removal of architectural barriers, total
17 facilities performance projects, advance land acquisition and telecommunica-
18 tions equipment among agencies without enumeration of projects costing in
19 excess of \$250,000 in the authorized state building program.

20 (5) LOANS. The building commission may make loans to agencies for
21 projects which are in programs not funded by general purpose revenues and
22 which are authorized under subsection (1) (n).

23 (6) LIMITED APPROVAL OF UNENUMERATED PROJECTS. (a) Notwithstanding
24 section 20.924 (1) of the statutes, the building commission may, during fiscal
25 years 1987-88 and 1988-89, approve the construction of a project costing in
26 excess of \$250,000 but not enumerated in subsection (1) if all of the follow-
27 ing conditions are met:

28 1. The project is funded from federal grants or private gifts or grants.

1 2. The commission determines that the construction is in the best inter-
2 ests of the state.

3 3. The joint committee on finance approves the project.

4 (b) This subsection does not apply to the projects specified in subsec-
5 tions (4), (8), (10) and (15).

6 (7) USE OF CASH SOURCES. Notwithstanding section 20.866 (2) (s) to (zm)
7 of the statutes, as affected by this act, and section 20.866 (2) (zz) of the
8 statutes or the state building program project enumerations in subsection (1),
9 the building commission may use available cash sources of funds in lieu of
10 borrowing under section 20.866 (2) (s) to (zm) of the statutes, as affected by
11 this act, and section 20.866 (2) (zz) of the statutes in fiscal years 1987-88
12 and 1988-89.

13 (8) WILLOW RIVER; NATURAL RESOURCES REALLOCATIONS. Notwithstanding
14 section 20.924 (1) of the statutes, the department of natural resources may
15 reallocate funds authorized for projects under subsection (1) (h) to finance a
16 project costing \$250,000 or less, or may reallocate up to \$509,000 of those
17 funds to finance a campground development at Willow river state park if the
18 department of natural resources determines that the project to be funded by
19 the reallocation has a higher priority than the projects enumerated under
20 subsection (1) (h) and if the building commission and the joint committee on
21 finance approve that reallocation.

22 (9) UNIVERSITY RESEARCH PARK. The board of regents of the university of
23 Wisconsin system is authorized to complete the infrastructure requirements of
24 the Rieder farm phase of the university research park at Madison including,
25 but not limited to, streets, sidewalks, utilities, lighting, landscaping,
26 required assessments and related charges and construction of the development's
27 water management system in the amount authorized in subsection (1) (m). In
28 lieu of program revenue supported borrowing, infrastructure improvements

1 authorized in subsection (1) (m) may be derived from any source or combination
2 of sources of funds, except that no funds for that purpose may be derived from
3 general purpose revenues.

4 (10) UNIVERSITY FACILITIES FUNDED FROM PROGRAM REVENUES. Notwithstanding
5 section 20.924 (1) of the statutes, any project costing in excess of \$250,000
6 for maintenance, health, safety and environment, energy conservation or
7 removal of architectural barriers for university of Wisconsin facilities
8 funded from program revenues may be approved by the building commission with-
9 out enumerating that project under subsection (1) (m).

***NOTE: Cross-references require review for continued
appropriateness.

10 (12) UNIVERSITY PHYSICAL EDUCATION FACILITIES. The board of regents of
11 the university of Wisconsin system shall determine the method of generating
12 and allocating any program revenues enumerated in subsection (1) (m) for the
13 construction of physical education facilities at the university of
14 Wisconsin-Platteville and university of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. Based on the
15 board's determination of that method, the building commission may adjust the
16 allocations of general fund supported borrowing enumerated in subsection (1)
17 (m) within the total authorized level for those physical education facilities.

18 ••87a0929/2•• (13m) UNIVERSITY SCHOOL OF BUSINESS. The building commis-
19 sion shall approve the expenditure of advance planning funds for a new facil-
20 ity for the university of Wisconsin-Madison school of business from gift funds
21 for that facility when \$4,000,000 of those gift funds have been received.

22 (14m) UNIVERSITY ENGINEERING BUILDING. The building commission shall
23 approve the expenditure of advance planning funds for an addition to the
24 engineering building at the university of Wisconsin-Madison from gift funds
25 for that addition when \$2,000,000 of those gift funds have been received.

26 (14r) UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-PLATTEVILLE. Notwithstanding the amount of
27 program revenue supported borrowing enumerated under subsection (1) (m) 2 for

1 the construction of physical education facilities at the university of
2 Wisconsin-Platteville, if the total amount of the bids for that construction
3 is less than \$6,092,000, the amount of that enumerated program revenue sup-
4 ported borrowing shall be reduced by the amount of the difference between the
5 total amount of the bids and \$6,092,000, up to the amount of that enumerated
6 program revenue supported borrowing.

7 (14rm) UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-STEVENS POINT. Notwithstanding the amount
8 of program revenue supported borrowing enumerated under subsection (1) (m) 2
9 for the construction of physical education facilities at the university of
10 Wisconsin-Stevens Point, if the total amount of the bids for that construction
11 is less than \$6,820,000, the amount of that enumerated program revenue sup-
12 ported borrowing shall be reduced by the amount of the difference between the
13 total amount of the bids and \$6,820,000, up to the amount of that enumerated
14 program revenue supported borrowing.

15 ••87b1753/2•• (14rp) UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-RIVER FALLS. Notwithstand-
16 ing section 20.924 (1) of the statutes, the board of regents of the university
17 of Wisconsin system may reallocate up to \$346,000 of the funds authorized
18 under subsection (1) (m) to finance a greenhouse development project at the
19 University of Wisconsin-River Falls if the funds are not needed for projects
20 enumerated under subsection (1) (m) and if the building commission approves
21 that reallocation.

22 (15) WOMEN'S MINIMUM SECURITY CORRECTIONAL CENTERS. Notwithstanding
23 section 20.924 (1) of the statutes, the department of health and social ser-
24 vices is authorized to establish one or more women's minimum security correc-
25 tional centers by purchase, lease or construction of one or more facilities
26 having a total of approximately 60 beds for work and study release into the
27 community, and internal programming on drug and alcohol abuse, personal coun-
28 seling and adult basic education if the joint committee on finance approves

1 that purchase, lease or construction. The department shall give consideration
2 to both state-owned and private property in making a site selection for any of
3 those centers.

4 (15m) WORKS OF ART FUNDING REALLOCATION. Notwithstanding sections 13.48
5 (10) and 44.57 (2) of the statutes, the building commission shall reallocate,
6 from funding for building projects determined by the commission in the autho-
7 rized state building program supported by borrowing, \$210,000 of the moneys
8 designated for the purchase of works of art in state buildings under section
9 44.57 (2) of the statutes during the 1987-89 fiscal biennium for the purpose
10 of restoration of works of art, as defined in section 16.84 (10) of the
11 statutes, in the state capitol building.

12 (16m) UNIVERSITY ECONOMIC AND BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS. As a part
13 of the capital planning process for the university of Wisconsin system, the
14 building commission shall consider projects that address facilities needs at
15 the university of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in programs which contribute to the
16 state's economic and business development, including architecture and urban
17 planning, business and fine arts. The building commission may approve
18 expenditure of advance planning funds for projects meeting the criteria
19 specified in this subsection prior to enumeration of the projects in the
20 authorized state building program.

22 (1m) ELIMINATION OF COUNCIL ON CRIMINAL JUSTICE.

23 (a) On the effective date of this paragraph, all records, materials,
24 supplies and equipment of the council on criminal justice are transferred to
25 the department of justice or the office of justice assistance in the depart-
26 ment of administration, as determined jointly by the attorney general and the
27 secretary of administration.

1 (b) On the effective date of this paragraph, all contracts entered into
2 and grants authorized by the council on criminal justice, which are in effect
3 on the effective date of this paragraph, remain in effect and are transferred
4 to the department of justice or the office of justice assistance in the
5 department of administration, as determined jointly by the attorney general
6 and the secretary of administration. Unless modified or rescinded, obli-
7 gations of contracts or grants shall be carried out by the department of jus-
8 tice or the office of justice assistance in the department of administration,
9 whichever is applicable.

10 (c) On the effective date of this paragraph, all assets and liabilities
11 of the council on criminal justice shall become the assets and liabilities of
12 the department of justice or the office of justice assistance in the depart-
13 ment of administration, as determined jointly by the attorney general and the
14 secretary of administration.

16 ••87b0073/2•• (2m) GERMAN TRADE OFFICE; LIMITATION ON EXPENDITURES. For
17 fiscal year 1988-89, \$176,100 of the amount in the appropriation under section
18 20.143 (1) (a) of the statutes, as affected by the acts of 1987, may not be
19 expended for a supplement to the German trade office unless approved by the
20 joint committee on finance at its 2nd quarterly meeting under section 13.10 of
21 the statutes in 1988.

22 (3g) FILM PROMOTION. The authorized FTE positions for the department of
23 development are increased by 2.0 GPR positions on the effective date of this
24 subsection, to be funded from the appropriation under section 20.143 (2) (c)
25 of the statutes, as created by this act, for the purpose of staffing for film
26 promotion under section 560.26 of the statutes, as created by this act.

27 ••87b1788/en•• (4g) GRANTS TO REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSIONS. The
28 department of development shall expend \$100,000 in fiscal year 1987-88 to

1 provide grants to regional planning commissions organized under section 66.945

19 scribed in section 560.27 of the statutes, for operating costs, except for
20 compensation of any officer or employe of the regional tourism development
21 corporation.

23 (a) Of the appropriation under section 20.143 (1) (d) of the statutes,
24 the department of development shall expend \$14,000,000 in fiscal years 1987-88
25 and 1988-89 as follows:

26 1. a. An amount not to exceed \$5,000,000 in grants or loans under sub-
27 chapter IV of chapter 560 of the statutes for Chrysler corporation.

1 b. If Chrysler corporation receives any federal funds for grants or loans
2 associated with federal job training programs in connection with a project
3 funded under subdivision 1. a, the total amount in grants or loans to Chrysler
4 corporation under subdivision 1. a shall be decreased by the amount of the
5 federal grants or loans and the amount of the decrease shall lapse to the
6 general fund.

7 2. a. An amount not to exceed \$9,000,000 in grants or loans under sub-
8 chapter IV of chapter 560 of the statutes for General Motors corporation.

9 b. If General Motors corporation receives any federal funds for grants or
10 loans associated with federal job training programs in connection with a
11 project funded under subdivision 2. a, the total amount in grants or loans to
12 General Motors corporation under subdivision 2. a shall be decreased by the
13 amount of the federal grants or loans and the amount of the decrease shall
14 lapse to the general fund.
