This is a report on the status of the Volatile Organic Compound (VOC) Growth Accommodation and Replenishment Program at the end of 1988. This program was developed as a result of a bill (1987 Wisconsin Act 27) signed into law in 1987 to accommodate opportunities for economic growth while reducing VOC emissions to attain the ozone standard. The amount of the VOC growth accommodation at the close of 1988 is 1,848 tons.

Subcommittee on Agricultural Marketing
