EXECUTIVE COMMUNICATIONS

Executive Order Number 67

Relating to a Special Session of the Legislature

- I, Tommy G. Thompson, Governor of the State of Wisconsin, pursuant to Article IV, Section 11 and Article V, Section 4 of the Constitution of Wisconsin, do require the convening of a special session of the Legislature at the Capitol in Madison, beginning on Tuesday, October 10, 1989 at 10:00 A.M. solely to consider legislation regarding illicit drug use and alcohol abuse in the following subject areas:
 - 1. Legislation relating to law enforcement and criminal justice initiatives.
 - Legislation relating to expansion of correctional facilities.
 - 3. Legislation related to correctional programs targeted toward drug users.
 - 4. Legislation related to various sanctions for drugrelated abuses, including but not limited to restriction of driving privileges and confiscation of assets.
 - Legislation related to treatment of drug and alcohol users and prevention of drug and alcohol abuse.
 - 6. Legislation related to expansion of media/ education efforts and community involvement/ assistance efforts.

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IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the State of Wisconsin to be affixed. Done at the Capitol in the City of Madison this twenty-ninth day of September in the year one thousand nine hundred and eighty-nine.
