Attached to this letter is the 1990 Department of Natural Resources Annual Finance Plan for the Clean Water Fund. The preparation, submission and approval by the Building Commission of the 1990 Annual Finance Plan is required under s. 144,241(4)(a), Stats. before the Department of Natural Resources can enter into loan agreements with municipalities for the construction of wastewater treatment facilities. The 1989-1991 Biennial

Budget required the submission of the 1990 Annual Finance Plan on December 1, 1989. After submission, the Building Commission is required under s. 13.48(26), Stats. to review, approve or disapprove the Annual Finance Plan and inform the Department of Natural Resources of its actions or recommendations. The existing statute authorizes the award of loan assistance no earlier than April 1, 1990. We believe that municipalities are anticipating that Clean Water Fund loan assistance will be available shortly after April 1, 1990, so the Department respectfully requests action on the Annual Finance Plan as soon as possible.

The Annual Finance Plan has been prepared to support the administration of the Clean Water Fund which provides financial assistance to municipalities that are required to construct new wastewater facilities needed to protect the surface and groundwaters in Wisconsin. The State's new clean water Fund Revolving Loan program is intended to encourage communities to undertake needed construction in a time frame that is in the best interests of the environmental resources to be protected.

There are two aspects of the 1990 Annual Finance Plan which we would like to highlight:

- I. Leveraging: The Department of Natural Resources will work to have legislation introduced and enacted as soon as possible to authorize a leveraged loan program. A leveraged loan program will address Wisconsin's wastewater needs at the lowest cost to state citizens.
- 2. Interest Rate Recommendations: For the 1989-1991 Biennium, the Department is recommending that interest rates for post transition projects be set at 50% of the market interest rate for Compliance Maintenance projects and New and Changed Limits projects, 62.5% of the market interest rate for Unsewered projects and 100% of the market interest rate for projects correcting effluent violations. This recommendation does not apply to "Transition" projects that were eligible for the Wisconsin Fund but did not have high enough priority to qualify for a grant. By statute, transition projects are funded at an interest rate of 3.5%.

The Department of Natural Resources anticipates that legislative changes to the Clean Water Fund Program will be introduced in the January session. The attached Annual Finance Plan satisfies the notification and approval requirements contained in existing law. Department staff will keep you informed of legislative changes that may be enacted, especially with respect to financial concerns in proposed legislation.
