Dear Assembly Chief Clerk Melvin:

With this letter I am transmitting a report regarding victim and witness assistance programs in Wisconsin. Under 1989 Wisconsin Act 31, sections 3034 (lcg) and (lcm), the Department of Justice is required to study means of limiting reimbursable county costs and restructuring state payments to counties. The Department is to submit findings and recommendations to the Chief Clerk of each house by January 1, 1990.

The Department's review of these issues has raised questions rather than providing answers. After a close examination of the issues, my staff recommended that additional analysis was warranted, including a review of experience in other key states. I agreed, particularly given the importance of these issues and the widespread interest in victim and witness assistance programs. My intent is to provide specific recommendations in a follow-up report, to be transmitted by February 15, 1990.

We have completed a report on the financing of school construction as required by 1989 Wisconsin Act 31. The report reviews existing methods used by school districts to finance construction and analyzes the need to establish a state-administered loan program for school districts.

The report concludes that a state loan program is not needed at this time. The report does recommend that the state consider providing additional state aid for debt service costs to lower school district reliance on property taxes to finance construction.

Attached in accordance with the provisions of Sections 109.12(2) and (3) of the statutes is the annual report of

the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations on its activities related to the enforcement and administration of s. 109.07 (Plant Closing and Mass Layoff Notification) during the period of September 12, 1990 through February 28, 1990. This report is to be distributed under s. 13.172(3) to the standing committees with jurisdiction over labor.

In summary, the report shows that since September 12. 1989 the department has received 41 notices of actual or potential closings or mass layoffs under either the amended state law, the federal Worker Adjustment and Retraining Act (WARN) or both. Prior to that date the department received 36 notices under either the federal act which went into effect on February 4, 1989, the original state plant closing law or both. The department received 17 notices under the provisions of the original state law between January 1 and March 1, 1989.

The department has received three complaints under the law during the reporting period. Two of these complaints are under investigation and an initial determination has been issued on the third. At this time no determinations have been made by the department under s. 109.07(5) and (6)(Exemptions from notice requirements).

Section 14 (1)(b) of 1989 Wisconsin Act 44 requires that the department establish the form for the notice required under s. 109.07(7) no later than February 1, 1990. Attached for your information are the materials sent to approximately 14,000 businesses in October, 1989 summarizing the requirements for employer compliance under the federal Worker Adjustment and Retraining Notification Act (WARN) and the Wisconsin Plant Closing Law in fulfillment of that requirement. Section 14(1)(a) of Act 44 requires the department to submit the proposed rules required under the act to the Legislative Council staff no later than July 1, 1990. Those rules are currently being drafted.
