RE: Report of 1989 Faculty Fringe Benefits

Earlier this month you received from President Shaw a copy of the above captioned report. This office would like for you to have the supporting documents to that report as prepared by Hewitt and Associates. Copies of the two Hewitt documents are transmitted herewith.

I am also sending you another copy of the <u>1989</u> <u>Faculty Fringe Benefits</u> report which I would like for you to substitute for the one you received from President Shaw. While the body and content of the report remain the same, we found that several of the footnotes in the report had errors in identifying the tables to which they referred. This footnoting error has been corrected in the substituted report.

The report also provides information about the cost of providing the benefits using data from the U.S. Department of Education's Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS). It should be noted that in the process of preparing this report, our staff discovered the cost data in IPEDS for the University of Wisconsin retirement contributions incorrectly included the amounts paid to fund post-retirement health insurance and prior service costs. The data presented in this report has been corrected.
