To the Honorable the Legislature

We have completed an evaluation of the Equal Rights Division of the Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. We evaluated the Division's efforts to meet its statutory responsibilities to address discrimination in housing, employment and public accommodations.

We found that the Division is meeting its statutory requirements to investigate complaints of discrimination. Representatives of both protected classes and of employer and housing organizations generally agree the Division's final rulings are reasonable and of uniform quality.

However, representatives of all groups identified numerous areas of concern with the pace and scope of the Division's. Our review confirmed the need for the Division to increase efficiency, reduce costs and alter procedures to meet all of its responsibilities. Currently, it takes an average of 620 days for an employment complaint to be investigated and receive a formal hearing, considerably beyond the Division's own limit of 450 days.

Our report includes recommendations designed to increase efficiency and allow the Division to complete cases more quickly. We also include recommendations which should result in some reduction in workload through earlier complaint settlements, which should reduce investigation costs to both the Division and complaint respondents. Finally, we identify steps the Division can take to improve its efforts in education and outreach and in programs to address systemic discrimination.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Division's staff. The response of the Division is the Appendix.

This letter and its attachment fulfills Wisconsin's responsibility to monitor the progress of the 1982 Wisconsin Ozone/Carbon Monoxide State

Implementation Plan ("PLAN") for the 1987 calendar year. The enclosed 1987 reasonable further progress report meets the U.S. EPA requirements set forth in 44 FR 7187 and 40 CFR, subpart Q.

The attached report shows that while there were continued reductions in ozone precursor (volatile organic compound) emissions for 1987, the ozone standard was not attained. Reported VOC emissions in 1987 (59,384 tons) were 4,508 tons below the plan predicted level (63,842 tons). We believe that several factors, including regional ozone transport processes and the simplistic modeling approach (EKMA), may have contributed to our failure to attain the ozone standard by December 31, 1987.

We ask that you review this report and comment on our reasonable further progress (RFP) assessment. Your review can be of aid to us in preparation of future RFP reports.
