# REPORT OF JOINT SURVEY COMMITTEE ON RETIREMENT SYSTEMS

# Appendix to Senate Bill 148

Public Policy Involved

The WRS is one of the best funded public pension plans in the country. The funding ratio (total accrued liabilities/assets) of the WRS is presently over 90% based upon the recognized "book value" of assets, and would be over 100% funded if calculated on market value. This funding level exceeds most other public pension plans.

On the other hand, surveys by the Retirement Research Committee (RRC) indicate that the WRS is about average in its benefit formula and is much more conservative in its normal retirement age requirements compared to other major public pension plans.

Senate Bill 148 establishes an early retirement window terminating on June 30, 1990 based upon a "Rule of 62/23", and 55/23 for protectives. This early retirement window will encourage many participants with long service to retire with little or no actuarial reduction. Employers will have the opportunity to leave some positions vacant, and to fill some positions at lower salary levels. This bill also makes permanent changes in the normal retirement provisions after the window closes which will make the WRS more competitive with other major public plans across the country.

The actuary estimates that the March 22, 1989 benefit package will increase costs on a weighted average of .08% of payroll--approximately \$4 million for 1990. This bill is largely funded by changes in actuarial and asset valuation procedures, and hence, the WRS will be less conservative thereafter. However, all the proposed changes are within the range of accepted actuarial practices for public pension plans. Lastly, this legislation provides that employee and employer participants shall share equally in any future changes in the contribution rates that may be required after 1990.

The Senate substitute amendment 1 to Senate Bill 148 makes a number of changes to address continuing concerns of the executive branch, and also presumably brings the package of funding and benefit costs into balance. The package as found in the substitute appears to have support of both the executive branch and the leadership in the legislature.

# RECOMMENDATION

The Joint Survey Committee on Retirement Systems does not recommend Senate Bill 148 as introduced, but the Committee finds that the Senate substitute amendment I to Senate Bill 148 is good public policy and recommends its passage.

The enclosed plan for delivery of services to mentally ill persons between the ages of 21 and 64 satisfies the statutory requirement specified in Wisconsin Act 399, section 3024(7). The plan was developed over the past four months with input provided by community and institution services providers and client advocates.

The plan addresses the service delivery needs of the affected mentally ill population in terms of current, planned, and future program directions the Department should pursue. A major portion of the plan deals with planned and future strategies for implementing sweeping federal policy changes affecting placement and reimbursement of mentally ill persons in long-term care facilities.

The advisory group to the plan stressed the need for the Department to promote funding and policy

initiatives that allow for a continuum of care at the local level with the fixed point of responsibility resting with the local 51 boards. The major recommendations contained in the plan can be found in the Executive Summary section preceding the full plan. The plan represents a significant effort on the part of staff from the Bureau of Community Programs and provides the Department with a road map for negotiating the many federal policy changes affecting both funding and services for mentally ill persons that will be occurring over the next five years. My staff and I will be able at your convenience to discuss this plan and to help the Department fulfill the budget mandate regarding submittal to the Governor and both houses of the Legislature.

We have completed an evaluation of the Work Experience and Job Training (WEJT) program, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. The evaluation was of the first 18 months of program operation in the five counties in which WEJT began as a pilot program. The evaluation includes a review of the early results of the WEJT program, and of implementation by both the counties and the Department of Health and Social Services.

More time is needed before a definitive judgment on the program's effectiveness can be made, since the program has had limited experience in serving the "hard to employ" AFDC recipient, a high priority client group. Preliminary results, however, show the WEJT program having mixed results in placing clients, reducing AFDC program costs, and assisting clients in getting jobs with higher wages.

The program will need to show improved results over time if it is to meet legislative expectations, but program implementation problems may impede efforts to assess the WEJT program's long-term effectiveness. Some elements of the program have not been fully implemented, such as an aid program to assist clients with day-care costs, and the Department has failed to ensure that critical program information has been collected.

The success of future efforts by the Department in achieving the the legislative goal of documenting which employment and training services are cost-effective depends, we believe, on whether the Department begins to exercise adequate leadership. We include several recommendations to the Department to improve program management.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the Department and the county staff and

We have completed audit work at the Office of the State Treasurer related to cash and securities in the custody of the Treasurer. This audit work was performed, in part, to satisfy our audit requirements under ss. 13.94(1)(a) and 13.94(1)(d), Wis. Stats. In addition, audit work was performed in conjunction with the audit of the financial statements presented in the State's Annual Fiscal Report.

We verified that the cash and securities reported by the Treasury were either in its custody, or appeared on statements of account prepared by the various financial institutions holding the cash and securities. In addition, we reconciled treasury cash and investment records to those of the Department of Administration which were reported in the Annual Fiscal Report, and to the investment records of the State of Wisconsin Investment Board which is responsible for the investment of the majority of the State's financial assets.

A summary of the securities in the custody of the Treasury as of June 30, 1988, is enclosed. Differences exist between this summary and the summary in the State's Annual Fiscal Report for 1988 because certain securities owned by the State are not required to be in the custody of the Treasurer, certain securities in the custody of the Treasurer are not required to be reported in the Annual Fiscal Report, and treasury records classify or report some securities on a valuation basis different from that used in the Annual Fiscal Report. A summary of these reconciling items is also enclosed. The enclosed summaries fulfill our reporting obligations under s. 13.94(1)(a), Wis. Stats.

We also included comments and recommendations to improve treasury operations in a separate letter to the State Treasurer. We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff of the Office of the State Treasurer.

We have completed an evaluation of the implementation of crime victim and witness rights and services, as requested by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. Recent changes in the rate at which counties have been reimbursed for their costs in the program have

prompted questions about future funding of the program.

Since county victim and witness assistance programs began in 1982, participating counties have received reimbursement from the State for 80 to 90 percent of their costs. It appears, however, that county programs have grown at such a rate that the Department of Justice's 1989-91 budget request is likely to yield a reimbursement rate of only 71 percent for fiscal year 1989-90 and 66 percent for fiscal year 1990-91. We have included funding alternatives for legislative and departmental consideration, including projections of the amount of funding necessary to maintain current service levels

In addition to reviewing funding for the program, we examined the Department's recent efforts to improve the technical assistance it provides counties. We noted that the Department could increase its effectiveness by, for example, promulgating the administrative rules Chapter 950 requires and developing annual reporting requirements which are more useful for monitoring county programs.

Finally, we noted that efforts to notify victims, at their request, when criminal offenders are released from custody are uniformly effective only in cases of parole. Legislative action would be necessary to make notification similarly effective for other types of release.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation we received from the Department of Justice, Department of Health and Social Services, and county victim and witness assistance program staff. The Department of Justice's response is Appendix II.

We have completed an evaluation of the state Forest Nursery Program operated by the Department of Natural Resources. As requested by the Joint Audit Committee, we assessed whether the Department is unfairly competing with privately-operated nurseries by subsidizing the sale of its stock with tax support, and we reviewed the appropriateness of the Department's participation in the federal Conservation Reserve Program.

Although the Department is required by statute to set prices for the sale of nursery stock at a level sufficient to recover direct and indirect costs, the 1989 stock prices are at least 32 percent below total cost. In addition to charging less than full costs, other significant reasons why the Department's prices are substantially less than those of private nurseries include the absence of profit from the Department's prices and the Department's use

of less costly distribution methods than those of private nurseries.

Regarding the Department's participation in the federal Conservation Reserve Program, we found both the cost sharing rate and the restrictions on the type of species allowed under the program promote a reliance on department stock. As a result, the Department will provide 6 to 12 times more seedlings to program participants than the private nurseries will provide in 1989

In anticipation of the continued needs of the Conservation Reserve Program, the Department has requested \$515,700 in the FY 1991-93 biennium to expand nursery production. Our analysis found, however, that the needs of the Conservation Reserve Program could be met at current production levels and expansion is unnecessary. While meeting all of the program's demands would be delayed for one year, this is allowable under current federal regulations. However, the Department has already proceeded with the proposed expansion without informing the Legislature or the Department of Administration, and will internally reallocate funds from general operations, land acquisition, development, and improvement.

Our report includes recommendations designed to ensure the future recovery of all costs, both direct and indirect, through the sale of nursery stock. We also include a recommendation which should result in an increased ability of private nurseries to provide seedlings to the Conservation Reserve Program.
