PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau

May 11, 1989

To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed an evaluation of the State's amusement ride safety program as requested by the Joint

Legislative Audit Committee. The Department of Industry, Labor and Human Relations is responsible for registering and conducting safety inspections on all amusement rides operating in the state.

We found that serious injuries appear to occur in only a small number of the accidents reported to the State each year. However, the State currently has no way of knowing whether all serious amusement ride injuries are being reported by operators, or whether the reports that are filed are accurate. We have included recommendations for the Department to improve reporting by collection insurance claim data, by requiring more prompt reporting of serious accidents, and by requiring the accident victim's signature on each accident report.

We believe that adoption of formal inspection goals and a more formal procedure for scheduling ride inspections could improve staff productivity and efficiency. We also note that several long-standing amusement ride safety issues, such as the use of restraints on children's rides, have yet to be resolved, largely because the Department has not convened its amusement ride code advisory committee since 1985. We include a recommendation for the Department to convene the committee for the purpose of establishing safety standards in these areas.

Finally, we note that total inspection fee revenue offset approximately 60 percent of inspection costs in the last three years and we include a recommendation that the Department establish a fee for reinspections which are currently without charge.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation provided to us by department staff. The Department's response is the Appendix.
