PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS State of Wisconsin Department of Transportation

To the Honorable the Legislature:

This report is the Wisconsin Department of Transportation's response to Section 3052(6m) 1987 Wisconsin Act 27.

'(6m) Howard Avenue Study. The Department of Transportation shall study the need for, estimate the cost of, and identify appropriate sources for construction of Howard Avenue between South Pennsylvania Avenue and South Lake Drive in the City of St. Francis. The Department of Transportation shall submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the chief clerk of each house of the Legislature, under Section 13.172(4) of the statutes, no later than June 30, 1989.

This report is based upon a 1987 study of Howard Avenue done by Howard Needles, Tammen and Bergendoff (HNTB) at the direction of the City of St. Francis. Our decision to use the HNTB study came after a thorough review of the study and the conclusion that the HNTB study fulfills the requirement of Section 3052(6m) and additional Departmental study was not necessary.

The Department strongly supports extending Howard Avenue from the Lake Arterial to Lake Drive.

The March 10, 1989, agreement with the City of St. Francis established the local-state financial arrangements necessary for the Department of Transportation to program the Howard Avenue project. Design activities are currently underway and construction is scheduled for 1995. State funding for this project will come from the department's 1994-95 biennial budget request for the Existing Highway Improvement Program and, therefore, depends on continued legislative support for that program.

Local consensus on the recommended alternative and their financial support to the project successfully completes the actions initiated by this study.

The complete technical report of the Howard Avenue study is available from the Department of Transportation.
