#### PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS

State of Wisconsin Legislative Audit Bureau

November 1, 1989

To the Honorable the Legislature:

We have completed our evaluation of the procedures the Wisconsin Racing Board used in reviewing the first group of applications fro greyhound racetrack licenses, as directed by the Joint Legislative Audit Committee. While a number of lawsuits have raised questions about the legality of the decisions the Board made, we reviewed the Board's procedures, to determine whether improvements ti the process could be made in the next round of application review.

We found that the Board's procedures were not sufficiently developed to assure the public that the review process was thorough. The procedures did not establish specific criteria against which applications were judged, nor did they lead to documentation and a record of the reasoning involved in the decisions sufficient to ensure public confidence that the decisions were appropriate.

To improve its procedures, the Board needs to: adopt more specific review criteria, clarify the required content of license applications, direct staff to provide a complete analysis of all application information, and provide an explanation of its decisions which it can document are based on the facts and evidence submitted.

It also appears that the Board gave inadequate consideration to involving the public in the process of application review. We have included recommendations for improving notification to the public of Board meetings and allowing more public participation in the review of the tracks' environmental effects

In addition, there appears to be a need to clarify various provisions of the racing regulations in ch. 562. Wis. Stats., especially regarding how the Board is to evaluate competing racetrack proposals.

We appreciate the courtesy and cooperation extended to us by the staff of the Racing Board and the other state agencies involved in the process of reviewing the license applications. The Racing Board's response is Appendix II
